His speeches are logical, forcible, and to the point. His bills, etc., offered to the House are models of clearness and brevity, embodying matter for beneficial legislation. As instances of the truth of the latter statement, we print a bill and a joint resolution, which were presented by our member on the first of the present month:

A BILL

Making an appropriation for the making of slack-water navigation in the Kiskiminetas, Conemaugh, and Allegheny Rivers in Pennsylvania.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That the sum of three hundred thousand dollars be, and is hereby appropriated for the improvement of the navigation of the Kiskiminetas and Conemaugh Rivers in Pennsylvania, up to Blairsville, or as much higher as may be practicable, and of the Allegheny River up to Brady's Bend, or as much higher as may be practicable, by making slack-water navigation in said streams; such sum, for the purpose aforesaid, to be expended under the direction of the Secretary of War.

Sec. 2. That the Secretary of War be hereby directed to cause a survey to be made of the Kiskiminetas and Conemaugh Rivers as high up as Blairsville, or higher, if necessary, and of the Allegheny River as high as Brady's Bend, or higher, if necessary, for the purpose of making slack-water navigation in said streams; and that the sum of twelve thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be hereby appropriated for making said survey, and to make report of such survey, together with his estimate of the entire cost of making slack-water navigation in said streams, to this

Congress, not later than the first Monday in December next.

JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, (two-thirds of each House concurring therein), That the following article is hereby proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, and when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States, shall be valid to all intents and purposes as a part of the Constitution, to wit:

ARTICLE.—

There shall not be paid any claim against the United States unless presented agreeably to the provisions of law by the claimant, within six years after having the legal right and capacity so to do, or within such less period as may be provided by law. Claims rejected by any officer having jurisdiction to examine the same, or rejected by either house of Congress, shall not be again examined, or paid, after six years have elapsed from such rejection.

[The above joint resolution was offered to effect a limitation on the presentation of all claims. The reason for offering it was the presentation to Congress of claims more than fifty years old.—Ed.]

Notice U. S. Internal-Revenue Special Taxes.

Under the Revised Statutes of the United States, Sections 3232, 3237, 3238, and 3238, and 3139, every person engaged in any business, avocation, or employment, which renders him liable to a special tax, is required to procure and place and keep conspicuously in his establishment or place of business a STAMP denoting the payment of said special tax for the special-tax year beginning May 1, 1878. Section 3224, Revised Statutes, designates who are liable to special tax. A return, as prescribed on Form 11, is also required by law of every person liable to special tax as above. Severe penalties are prescribed for non-compliance with the foregoing requirements, or for continuing in business after April 30, 1878, without payment of tax.
