The Yosemite was the twenty-eighth naval vessel that has been lost through various causes in the last forty years.

"The fortune of war," says the President, "has thrown upon this nation an onerous trust which should be unselfishly discharged, and devolved upon this government a moral, as well as a material responsibility toward these millions whom we have freed from an oppressive yoke." CONGRESSMAN JOSEPH C. STURLEY has introduced a resolution proposing an amendment to the constitution fixing the term for President of the United States at six years, and making him ineligible for re-election. The new amendment would also at the end of the president's term, make him Senator-at-large during good behavior, or in other words, for life. The idea seems to be pretty generally accepted as a good one, particularly that portion lengthening the term to six years. Some seem to look upon the idea of making the ex-president a life-senator as a bad one, and un-American, but these are the scarey ones, who are eternally burdened with the fear that some time or other this great republic might in some mysterious manner lose its identity. There would never likely be more than one or two of this class of Senators in the national congress at any one time. Six years is about the proper length for a presidential term.

Prosperity Seares Them.

The Atlanta Constitution has a bad case of the shivers. It is real blue over the result of the election. The South, which has been selling its cotton for the past few years at five, six and seven cents a pound, has sold this year's crop at ten cents and feels in consequence very much elated. The Constitution rebukes it for this hopeful feeling. It tells the Southern people that they are in the hands of the terrible trusts, and that they should therefore proceed to be as miserable as possible. Says the Constitution: "No matter how high the price cotton may bring, it cannot bring returns enough to meet the exactions of the trust, if you commit yourself to its tender mercies. Remember that there is no escape. The laws against combinations are valueless in the hands of men who are pledged to stand by the exactions of their masters."

Prosperity has proselyted Democracy in the North and the Constitution is evidently determined to take time by the forelock and prevent such a catastrophe in the South if possible. It goes on to advise the Southern farmer not to "be deluded by ten-cent cotton, or even by twenty-cent cotton if such a thing should come."

This apprehension of possible good fortune is one of the highest compliments that the Constitution could have paid the Republican administration. It shows that the South has felt the wave of prosperity that has swept the country and that it has unshaken faith in a continuance of the same. And it is further demonstrated that prosperity is, as it always has been, the greatest foe that Democracy has ever encountered.

HELD FOR MURDER.

Rev. D. E. Stuart Let Go on a Charge and Arrested on Another. WILKES-BARRE, Dec. 8.-A warrant for murder was served Thursday on Rev. D. E. Stuart, formerly pastor of the Baptist church at Wroning, and he is now in jail awaiting the hearing, which is fixed for Monday. Stuart is the minister who was arrested in Philadelphia on Nov. 18 on the charge of performing an unlawful operation on his wife. Constable Kulp was the prosecutor, and he also had a warrant for murder, which he did not serve. Since then Stuart has been under bail here awaiting a hearing on the operation charge. After several postponements it took place before Judge Woodward, and as the commonwealth failed to substantiate its charges, Mr. Stuart was discharged. Two doctors testified that there had been no operation. The father of the woman, William Harris, then had a warrant sworn out charging the minister with murder. Alderman Perkins before whom he was taken, refused to accept bail, and as the witnesses for the prosecution were not at hand, he adjourned the case for a hearing on Monday. The suspicion of murder is based on the knowledge that on the day his wife died Mr. Stuart bought a bottle of carbolic acid and that he was alone in the room with her for the two hours preceding her death. This is according to the story of the woman's aunt, in whose house she was. The aunt was called to the side of the young wife by the shout of the husband for help. She found the wife's throat and mouth, burned by the carbolic acid. She died in a few minutes. The husband got not satisfactorily explain how his wife got the acid. He said he did not see her take it.

LEFT ALL TO CHARITY.

Woman Who Lived in Poverty Left Wealth to Church. M'KEESPORT, Dec. 7.-Alone, just as she had lived, Mrs. Pauline Aubrie died. She was buried here Wednesday. She left an estate valued at \$250,000, all of which goes to charity. For many years Mrs. Aubrie had lived in comparative poverty. She was decried by her neighbors because of her violent temper. She was known to own property, but it was not imagined that she was as wealthy as she is now shown to have been. She accumulated her fortune from the profits obtained from a roadside saloon and by lending money. Most of her wealth is in realty, secured by the foreclosing of mortgages. Mrs. Aubrie was 72 years old and was born in Germany. She has brothers and sisters living in England and Wales, but has had little communication with them for many years. Her husband died 23 years ago. Since his death Mrs. Aubrie had had most of the time alone. Occasionally she adopted children, never having had any of her own, but the home was not attractive, and they left her as they grew up. According to her directions all of the estate, with the exception of a few small bequests to relatives, goes to St. Peter's Catholic church. Part of it is to be used in the erection of a German Catholic church and the remainder in the establishment of the Aubrie Home for Orphan and a hospital for children.

Colonel Bennett's Will Stands.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 7.-Judge Hanna has filed an opinion in the orphans' court sustaining the validity of the will and codicils of Colonel Joseph M. Bennett. The court refused to send the case to the common pleas for trial by jury, and dismissed the appeal from the decision of the register of wills. Mr. Bennett bequeathed nearly the whole of his fortune to the University of Pennsylvania and the Methodist Orphanage Home. Among the properties bequeathed to the university is the Chestnut Street Opera House. The estate is worth about \$2,500,000.

Boy Meets a Frightful Death.

FRANKLIN, Dec. 7.-The body of Lewis Cavley, aged 15 years, was found under the pulley wheel of the engine in a boiler house near his home in Petroleum Center, this county. No one was present when the accident happened, but it is supposed that in passing from one side of the boiler house to the other he was caught by the belt and hurled into a jelly and his brains were crushed over the floor. His body had stopped the machinery.

Electric Plants to Change Hands.

STUEBENVILLE, Dec. 7.-Negotiations are under way by which Eastern capitalists will purchase the Steubenville Gas and Electric plant and the Steubenville Traction company's line in this city. The light plant has a city contract for 10 years. It is the intention to extend the street railway up the river to Toronto and Empire and touch at Brown's island, which will be made a summer resort. The deal will involve \$250,000.

No Requisition For Rhodes.

HARRISBURG, Dec. 8.-Governor Stone gave a hearing in the matter of protest against the issue of a requisition for William Rhodes, arrested in New York for alleged fraud in a real estate deal in Philadelphia. Bartow Weeks of New York appeared for Rhodes and convinced Governor Stone that it was an attempt to collect a debt by a criminal proceeding. Governor Stone accepted this view of the case and refused the requisition.

Six Hurt in Mine Explosion.

WILKES-BARRE, Dec. 7.-Write a number of men were driving a plate in the Maxwell mine of the Lehigh and Wilkes-Barre Coal company at Asbury an explosion of gas occurred which injured six men and damaged the mine to some extent. Martin Moran and John Fustler may die. The explosion was caused by one of the men lighting a fever of gas not known to exist.
