NEW ORLEANS, MARCH 21, 1847.
EIGHT DAYS LATER FROM SALTILLO.
Dr. Turner arrived at this place on this...
morning with despatches from Col. Curtis—
He brings some further particulars of the...
battle of Buena Vista. Dr. Turner confirms the...
truth of the accounts of the battle which will...
be found in another column. He further states...
that the news was brought to Monterey by...
Paymaster Coffey, who was bearer of despatches...
from Gen. Taylor, but who could not proceed...
with them any farther. The despatches were...
then entrusted to a Mexican, who had not as...
yet made his appearance.

Nothing had been heard of Col. Curtis since...
he left Camargo to look after Ureca.
Private letters, says the N. O. Picayune, had...
been received at Saltillo as late as March 5th...
at which time Gen. Taylor was still at Buena...
Vista.
The following letter was received at Matamoros...
by a Mexican merchant of that place, from a...
Mexican of Saltillo. It was dated on the 6th...
of March, and gives the only account of the...
manner in which the battle was fought that...
has yet been received—

"At 3 o'clock on the 22d ult., the battle...
commenced at Buena Vista, five miles from...
Saltillo. The fight opened with artillery, and...
a destructive cannonade was kept open until...
sunset. No decided advantage was obtained...
by either side—the loss on both sides being...
very great.

"On the 23d, at 10 o'clock, the battle was...
again renewed and kept up without intermission...
until half-past three in the afternoon—
Both armies were closely engaged during the...
whole time. Gen. Wool advanced with a...
strong detachment against the Mexican army...
but was driven back with immense loss. The...
Mexican cavalry charged upon him with...
swords and did great execution. *Wool fell back...
Gen. Taylor advanced with fresh troops and...
repelled the Mexicans with great slaughter!*...
This charge decided the battle, which was...
not again renewed. The number killed and...
wounded was very great on both sides. I can...
only estimate the number by the cart loads of...
wounded that have entered this city from both...
battles fields.

"On the 24th both armies hung out without...
coming to a general engagement—each occupied...
in carrying off the wounded and burying their...
dead.
"After the 24th there was no more fighting...
—the Mexican troops furnishing with hunger...
became convinced that they could not triumph...
over Gen. Taylor from his position, and retired.

"As yet Santa Anna is only retired a short...
distance, but I do not entertain the belief that...
he will venture another engagement.
"Mexico has not the means to bear the...
burden of the war—it is opposing poverty to...
abundance—weakness to strength. In my opinion...
it would be best for the two governments...
to enter into negotiations. With the power...
the United States possess it would be dishonorable...
in her to force us into treaties advantageous...
alone to herself, as it would be for us to...
make concessions from necessity.

"It is reported that a train carrying provisions...
to the American army was attacked and captured...
at Marina, by Don Jose Ureca, and soon...
afterwards a quantity of private merchandise...
taken at the same time, &c."
The Matamoros "Flag" of the 13th ult.,...
says that Gen. Taylor, with the Kentucky...
cavalry, was expected at Monterey, on the 8th...
of March, for the purpose of opening a...
communication between that place and Camargo.
We wish we had room to publish the...
Mexican accounts of the battle of Buena Vista—
They would really make our readers split their...
sides with laughter.

NEW ORLEANS, MARCH 25, 1847.
The news which had arrived at this place...
to-day, is not of any very special importance.
The Sam'l N. Gott had arrived from the Brazos...
with three companies (B., C. & D.), Captains...
Roberts and Blalock. Rumors had been bro't...
to New Orleans of a battle between Col. Curtis...
and Gen. Ureca, but they were not creditable...
Volunteers are daily arriving at the Brazos...
Five of the N. Carolina companies, three...
from Massachusetts, and two from Virginia...
had arrived. It was expected that the North...
Carolina Volunteers would immediately proceed...
to Matamoros to relieve the 24 Mississippi...
Riflemen, who would proceed instanter to...
Camargo and Monterey. So that Col. Curtis...
before this time, has been so reinforced as to...
be able to meet Gen. Ureca, even should he be...
at the head of 5000 cavalry. It is generally...
supposed that Santa Anna will endeavor to...
make his way back to San Luis Potosi. The...
following paragraph from the Matamoros Flag...
of the 13th March, would go to confirm us in...
this belief—

"We understand from reliable authority that...
there are letters in negotiation, from Mexicans...
stating that Santa Anna is full retreat to San...
Luis Potosi. The letters also state that he...
held a consultation with his principal officers...
after his first day's engagement, and that a...
retreat was then strenuously advocated. Before...
the battle commenced, the Mexicans firmly...
believed that Gen. Taylor would retire before...
their vastly superior numbers, and that in his...
retreat they could supply themselves with...
provisions, of which they were much in need...
almost starving. Finding the Americans...
obstinate and determined to fight for their...
entails with the ferociousness of bull dogs, they...
depaired of getting a dinner from them and...
deemed it prudent to retire.
The above contains the substance of the...
news in the New Orleans papers, up to the...
25th. Should any further arrive before we...
go to press, we shall give it."

MEMORANDUM FURNISHED BY CAPT. POWERS,
OF THE SCHOONER PORTIA.
Schooner Portia, Capt. Powers, 8 days from...
Tampico anchorage, but was detained to the...
south and east of Vera Cruz by a heavy north...
gale until the 17th inst. The U. S. Squadron and...
all the transports left Tampico for Sacrificos on...
the 9th inst., with 12,000 troops. On the...
morning of the 10th a landing of all the troops...
and materiel was effected within three miles of...
 Vera Cruz, without much opposition from the...
enemy, as the landing was well covered by a...
constant discharge of bomb shells and round shot...
from the U. S. steamers & gunboats anchored...
near the beach and in front of the landing. Immediately...
after an organization of the American forces...
on the beach, they took a line of march over...
the sand hills, to the attack of the enemy's...
outposts and fortifications, situated from one to...
three miles from the castle and forts of the city...
They carried every one by storm, not, however...
without losing seven men.
On the 11th inst., the American forces...
were employed in throwing up breastworks and...
digging entrenchments. Occasional skirmishing...
took place with the enemy, who were throwing...
showers of bomb shells and round shot from the...
castle and city, but without much effect. During...
this time the enemy were landing provisions and...
ammunition on the transports, and were...
annoying the U. S. fleet, by firing at the...
transports. On the 12th a strong north gale set in...
which cut off all further communication. We left...
the north, and as we were unable to make...
progress to the north, believe that it was...
impossible for our bombs and shells to have...
landed on the 18th inst., so that the bombardment...
of the castle and Vera Cruz did not probably...
commence until the 20th.
There were some feints of bravery displayed...
on the 11th, in which Col. Dickerson, of the...
Palmetto Regiment, South Carolina, was...
wounded in the breast by a musket ball from the...
enemy, and Capt. Abourat, of the 2d Infantry, had...
his head shot off by a 32-pounder ball. This...
ball broke a drummer's arm and took off a...
private's leg.
Not on the same day the American army had...
gained complete possession of all the fortifications...
of the enemy which were raised by them to stop...
troops from approaching the city. All the...
water-pipes leading to the city were cut off, and...
all the communications effectually stopped. Gen...
Scott landed in person on the 11th inst. A...
French barque ran the blockade and moored...
under the walls of the castle on the morning of...
the 15th, and the United States transports were...
ready to leave for Matamoros as soon as the...
war was over. This vessel brings despatches and...
letters from Gen. Taylor, N. C., by George R...
French and James Johnson, only Agents.

THURSDAY, 1st April, 1847.
STILL LATER.
The Southern mail has just arrived, bringing...
us New Orleans dates up to the 26th ult.
There is not much of importance by this arrival...
more than what was known before. We give...
the most important items.
The schr. Southerner arrived on the 25th at...
New Orleans from the Brazos, where she left...
on the 19th March. Mr. Crittenden, bearer...
of despatches, came passenger, and reports...
that Santa Anna's infantry had already dis...
banded, and that he was in full retreat for San...
Luis Potosi. Gen. Taylor was not only in...
possession of Saltillo and Buena Vista, but...
was quietly encamped at Agua Nueva—just...
vacated by the Mexicans. It is believed that...
Santa Anna has ordered Ureca and Canales to...
withdraw to the other side of the Sierra. It...
is also stated on the best authority, that...
insurrections are already taking place in...
Santa Anna's army, and that there is no doubt...
but that he will be very shortly overthrown,
and that peace will be the result, as there is...
no other man in Mexico who can keep the...
army together for one week. Before Santa...
Anna retreated from Agua Nueva, he sent in...
a message to Gen. Taylor to the effect that he...
(S. A.) would fight him again, but he would...
select a better field next time. To which Gen...
Taylor replied, in substance—that he (Santa...
Anna) knew he was whipped—that he was...
beaten, and therefore he (Gen. T.) advised...
him to send in proposals for a surrender, which...
would be considered. A letter, dated Monte...
rey, March 3, from Paymaster J. B. Butler,
has the following passages—
"I have no doubt of the dissolution of Santa...
Anna's army, morally and physically, and...
there will be no more fighting in this region...
if there be any anywhere."
"Gen. Santa Anna is really to be pitied—
His men are a wretched set. He had twice...
during the battle, to interpose his lance...
to prevent desertion, and they shot down 50...
each time before he could stop the flight of his...
infantry."
The following letter is from an officer who...
was in the battle of Buena Vista:
"SALTILLO, March 1st, '47.
"Our scouts bring in word that Santa Anna...
has gone for good, and that the whole...
infantry has dispersed. There is no doubt of...
it; we shall see him again on this line."
"To Col. Warren received a despatch...
from the Governor, (of this place,) informing...
him that American Commissioners were now...
in the city of Mexico, and had written to the...
Mexican Congress, saying that they were...
willing to make an honorable peace."
"The Governor requested permission to...
return to the city, to assist in keeping order, and...
promising to comply with any requisition made...
upon him."
Col. Curtis was at Cerulvo on the 13th...
March, with his own (Ohio) regiment, and...
some of the Virginia Volunteers from the Rio...
Grande.
The Picayune states on the authority of...
Maj. Coffey, that General Taylor is very short...
of supplies in Monterey and Camargo, and is...
probably in one of these places now.
This is the sum and substance of the...
intelligence from General Taylor.
We find a letter in the Picayune, dated...
Anson county, 7th March, devoted to Mexican...
affairs, from which we gather that the...
Revolution in the city of Mexico had not yet...
been decided.
Santa Anna's account of the battle of Buena...
Vista had been published in Mexico, and he...
claims a victory! Says that he lost 1000...
men, and the Americans 2000!

the details of the investment of Vera Cruz,
but nothing later from that quarter than what...
will be found in another column. In next...
week's paper we hope to have the pleasure of...
