Sugar—At R. O. holds in good demand at \$12 a \$13 per M.

CHARLESTON, Feb. 20.—Cotton.—The Cotton market was very quiet yesterday, the transactions having been confined to some 450 bales, at extremes ranging from 5 to 7 1/2-16th. We have no change to notice in prices. Rice—The Rice market was also quiet. Sales about 400 tonnes, from \$2 to \$3 1/2 per hundred. Former prices fully sustained. Rough Rice—Nothing was done in this article.

BALTIMORE MARKET, Feb. 20.—The flour market is very quiet. There are buyers at \$4 87 1/2, but holders generally ask \$4 93 1/2 for Howard street brands. City Mills held at \$5. Corn meal and Rye flour unchanged. The supply of grain is very light. We quote red wheat nominally at 1 04 a 1 10; white \$1 15. Corn is steady—small sales at 28 a 30 cents. Rye 60 cents. Provisions are quiet. Hogs and Pork are somewhat firmer, but we note no change in prices. Groceries steady; sales mostly in a small way. Whiskey is selling at 22 1/2 a 23 1/2 cents.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 20, P. M.—There is not much doing in Flour. Sales of common brands at \$5. Corn Meal and Rye Flour unchanged. The supply of Grain is light. Holders of wheat are firm. Small sales of Red at \$1 08 a 1 10. Corn is steady. Sales of 4,000 bushels Yellow at 58 cents. Oats 30 cents. Rye 66 cents. There is a steady demand for provisions. Sales of Mess Pork at \$12 and Prime 10 50. Mess Beef \$13. Bacon unchanged. Lard 7 a 8 cents. Groceries steady. Rice \$4 a 3 1/2 cents per lb. There is no marked change in market yesterday, but the market if anything is duller. Sales small. Whiskey is selling at 24 cents per gallon in bbls.—Balt. Sun.

NEW-YORK, Feb. 20—6 P. M.—The Flour market is steady, and rather in favor of sellers. The sales today amount to 4,000 bushels at 5 4 a 5 62 and \$5 75 for common Western and Genesee brands. Southern held at \$5 50.—Rye Flour \$3 31; and corn meal at \$2 94 per bbl. Wheat continues in good demand for milling purposes, with sales of 3,000 bushels Genesee at 1 30 a 1 31; and 2,000 bushels red at 1 12. Corn is duller—sales of about 12,000 bushels at 55c for mixed, and 60c for yellow. No change in oats or rye. There is less movement in pork. The sales today 500 bbls at \$11 50 for mess and \$10 25 to \$10 75 for prime. Sales of 200 bbls lard at 6 1/2c, and 600 bbls grease at 5 1/2c. Lard 8 1/2c. Bacon unchanged. Mess beef \$13. Sugars and molasses continue firm. Rice 3 1/2 a 3 3/4c per lb. The cotton market is quiet. No change, however, to notice in prices from yesterday. The sales amount to 700 bales, rather in favor of buyers. Whiskey 23 a 23 1/2c per gal. in bbls.—Balt. Sun.
