

Arrival of the Empire City—Later from Havana.

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—The steamer Empire City, from Havana, with dates to the 23d, arrived here today.

The company of wharf negroes drew a prize of \$100,000 in a lottery on the 18th.

Schools are to be established at Havana, in which all the arts and sciences are to be taught gratis.

New laws have been issued for the suppression of the slaves trade.

Trouble was anticipated from the troops at Havana on the occasion of the proclamation of the new constitution. All, however, passed off quietly, but the city guards were doubled on that day.
