THE ELECTION IN LOUISIANA—A most decisive Democratic Triumph.
The southern mail which reached this city yesterday afternoon brought the New Orleans papers of the 5th, 6th, and 7th instants. They contain the returns of the election held on the 5th to fully warrant the confident belief that the democracy of Louisiana have nobly justified the confidence reposed in their firmness, arduous and unswerving devotion to duty. The victory which they have so gloriously, but not unexpectedly, achieved, is full, complete and decided. The city of New Orleans, which gave a majority of nearly three thousand for the democracy last fall, now gives for a portion of the known-votes a nominal majority of only four hundred and six, which majority was secured by fraud, violence and murder.
The Louisiana Courier of the 7th instants thus notices some of the election scenes in New Orleans, and their consequences:
"With the exception of an occasional knock-down at several other points, nothing of a very serious nature took place until after they had been closed. The result, so far as the leading patriots and sons of the soil could ascertain, was, we should judge from what subsequently took place, anything but satisfactory. There was actually danger that they would have been overthrown by a majority at least much less by their boasted one. It was necessary to save the credit, as prophets, of their orators and organs; and hence the immediate question was, how to effect that great end. We think there was but little time occupied in deliberation before it was resolved that, as the seventh and ninth precincts doubtless contained larger anti-know-nothing majorities than any others, they should in turn be stormed, and their vote thereby if possible destroyed. The attack was begun at the ninth precinct, and took place, we hear, about 9 o'clock, p. m. Everything was perfectly quiet, and the commissioners and clerks were engaged in counting the votes, when all at once a number of men, according to our informant, were gently dressed, and who were not rowdies in the usual acceptance of the term, made their appearance in the room. After several of them had had some conversation in an under tone, with one of the commissioners, two of them rushed at the ballot box, while their acquaintance was stooping over it, seized it, threw it into the air, and when it fell, joined with their companions in trampling it to pieces, and kicking the ballots which it contained about the room. The box contained 405 votes, of which there was an average democratic majority, according to a count made by two of the commissioners, about 130 for the democratic candidates. No loud words were used; the thing had evidently been concerted, and so soon as their work was accomplished the valiant patriots retired. The destruction of this ballot-box secured, as the performers thought, the election of Alexander Montee as a Democrat (know-nothing) to the house of representatives, over Messrs. Gordon and Le Blanc, (democrats); but of this, we hear, the legislature will have something to say."
The destruction of the ballot-boxes in the 7th and 9th wards is thus noticed in the Delta:
"Our readers are aware, as a matter of course, that the ballot-boxes of two of the precincts which give small democratic majorities were destroyed on Monday night. It is well known that in the seventh precinct Wickliffe had a majority of 213, and Bell's majority was 234. The majority in the ninth precinct was at least 21 for these candidates, and some say it was as high as 60; but we doubt this, because the votes for justice of the peace and constable were counted and returned to the sheriff, and they show only 21 majority in favor of Wickliffe. In the two precincts, Mr. Bell's majority over Hufty, for sheriff, is 260."
In the first district Estus (know-nothing) is elected by a small majority. In the second district Col. Hunt (know-nothing) is undoubtedly defeated. His nominal majority in the city precincts is only forty; but in the town of Wilmington he is in a minority in the city of over a hundred and twenty votes. As we have already stated, the delegation from Louisiana in the next Congress will stand three democrats to one know-nothing.
The democrats have secured a decided majority in both branches of the legislature.
It is difficult, with the tables before us, to estimate correctly the democratic majority in the State. The whole of our State ticket is elected, beyond all doubt. The return from such of the parishes as have reached us show large gains for the democratic party. Our majority in the State will be at least two thousand, and may possibly be double that amount.
