

Arrival of Steamer Atlantic—four days later from Europe.

NABBY HOOK, Dec. 9th.—The Collins steamer Atlantic has just passed here going up to New York.

The steamer Asia arrived out on the evening of the 22nd. Her news was dull and unchanged, excepting a slight turn in favor of the dollar.

The British government has given official notice of its intention to furnish ships to the Atlantic telegraph.

The German government has recently issued a statement from Vienna that Baron Bismarck proposes to settle the Belgrade difficulty by splitting the differences and making the frontier pass to the north of Belgrade, but south of the Lake Yalupuk.

The Anglo-French alliance, though pregnant with speculations, may be regarded as settled.

We publish the following correspondence with great pleasure. The letters explain themselves, and the matters to which they relate are highly honorable to all the parties concerned in them.

NAUTICAL ALMANAC OFFICE. CAMBRIDGE, November 24, 1856.

COMMANDER C. H. DAVIS—DEAR SIR:—Now that your official connexion with us has ceased, and you are about to leave and assume the duties which have been assigned you by the Navy Department, it will not be improper for me to say a few words to you.

The establishment of an American Nautical Almanac Office is a fitting addition to our national and scientific progress; and although it might not have been considered as an immediate national necessity so long as we should consent to be under obligation to the British Nautical Almanac, still it was felt by the most eminent scientific men of the country to be particularly desirable, not only as subserving our great commercial interests, but also as a stimulus to the study of geographical, nautical, and astronomical science.

You were among those who held these opinions most strongly; and the prominent part you acted most justly be regarded as the principal cause which led to the establishment of this office.

Your appointment as the first superintendent to carry out the patriotic and generous intentions of the Government, by inaugurating so important a work and laying its foundations, was the testimony awarded you by common consent.

The difficulty and responsibility of the situation would have been materially lessened could you not have drawn to your aid the eminent number of practical astronomers conversant with all the intricacies of the complicated and laborious computations necessary in the preparation of the work; but the reverse was the case. Many of your assistants need to be educated in the practical details of the work before their services could be of much use.

Neither should it be forgotten, in view of such difficulties, how able and successful you were in your assistants to the level of mere computing machines, in end insinuating that enlightened and sagacious policy which has been the soul of your administration, and which, with the greatest economy, has contributed so much to stimulate and encourage the cultivation of those very sciences upon which the Almanac Office is so essentially dependent.

It is sufficient to add that your scientific brethren throughout the country have given you their unqualified approval.

And now, in conclusion, permit us to express to you the sentiments of esteem, gratitude, and affection to which your daily kindness and courtesy, for so many long years so eminently entitled you, with our best wishes for your health and usefulness, may long remain to you, and that you may return to the bosom of your family and to your friends with that fame you cannot fail to earn, and which will be the common pride of us all.
