The Ministerial Crisis: Progress of the Democratic Element.

A little while ago the London Times affected to be little and ridicule the Reform movement in England, and stoutly denied that the public mind was stirred about it.

This movement is an index of the Democratic element of its progress and its power; and what has been hurled the Derby minister from power.

Parties in England are certainly strangely mixed up. According to some of the journals, the most of those who voted against Lord Derby declared, in explicit terms, they would consent to anything rather than a return to power of Lord John Russell or Lord Palmerston.

A great barrier to the union of the Liberals is the reform question. The leading Whigs, these great aristocratic families who give the life to their party, in their pride of caste or fear of change, hesitate to concede enough to conciliate the popular element as represented in Mr. Bright.

These characters most prominently named for a future Premiership are Lord John Russell and Lord Palmerston—co-operators in free trade, but not of original party affinities.
