

Report of Gen. Beauregard of the Battle of Manassas, August 31, 1862.

GENERAL: The War Department having been informed by me, by the report of the 17th July, of the capture of the Federal position on the 21st of July, I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 21st of July, and to inform you that the same has been forwarded to the War Department for their consideration.

In view of the propositions approaching reinforcements to the army at Centreville as far as I could hear of, I have the honor to inform you that the reinforcements of the 21st of July, were not sent to the front, but were held in reserve at Centreville, and were not sent to the front until the 21st of July.

The enemy's force, as reported by their best informed sources, was about 30,000 strong. I had learned from reliable sources, on the night of the 20th, that the enemy was concentrating in and around Centreville, and that their right flank was in immediate proximity to the line of our position.

At that hour, the following was the disposition of our forces: The 1st Brigade, constituted as on the 18th July, remained in position at Union Mills, and its left extending along the line of the Potomac, and its right flank resting on the Potomac.

The 2nd Brigade, constituted as on the 18th July, remained in position at Union Mills, and its left extending along the line of the Potomac, and its right flank resting on the Potomac.
