The Old Fort Hotel was lifted from its foundation and carried from 15 to 20 feet, twisting the house around to some extent, besides the large and beautiful walnut and hickory trees, which surrounded it as shade trees, were torn from their roots and crushed to the ground. Salt for Oats. At a meeting of the Farmer's Institute of Eastern Pennsylvania recently, P. Merriam exhibited a sample of oats grown by H.
