RESULT OF RADICAL MEETING.

The Goldsboro Messenger briefly but pointedly calls attention to the result of Radical meeting in North Carolina. The story has been told before but it will bear telling many more times yet.

The public debt of the State of North Carolina up to the year 1868, when the present Constitution was adopted, and the subsequent Radical misrule began, may be classified thus: 1. Bonds issued before the war called "Old Bonds"..... \$8,372,900

2. Bonds issued since the war, but under acts passed before..... 2,297,000

3. Bonds issued since the war for internal improvements..... 1,129,000

4. Bonds issued since the war for funding interest and matured bonds..... 2,418,000

Total..... \$14,216,900

In plain words the State debt of North Carolina, say January 1, 1868, may be given in round figures at \$15,000,000, while Governor Brogden in his last message to the Legislature puts the total debt up to October, 1874, at \$18,921,848 05, of which he says \$14,295,930 is the special tax bonds issued in 1868 by the first Radical Legislature.

To make it still plainer, counting the interests accrued since October 1, 1874, the debt of North Carolina has nearly tripled—nearly three times as much—under eight years' Republican rule, than it was up to 1868, from the foundation of the government, and the debt is rapidly increasing by the accumulation of interest.

And so with the national debt, which in 1860 was only \$80,000,000, is now \$2,289,000,000. When these figures are thrown at the Republican politicians they immediately begin to shout "Ku Klux," "Jeff Davis" and the "Confederacy," endeavoring to throw the responsibility upon the Democratic party. This is all nonsense. Most of the stealing has been done since the war closed. The things that have been swindling the government, robbing it of millions and millions of dollars, have come into existence since 1868.

In 1868, when W. W. Holden was elected Governor, and with the adoption of the present Constitution, radicalism blossomed into full luxuriance in North Carolina, and since then they have been flourishing like green bay trees in the woods of the land-worm people. That is where the money has gone.

SUFFERING IN NORTH CAROLINA.

The Charleston News and Courier says: "About twenty bushels of corn, eleven barrels of flour and 225 in yards were especially wanted in this last week, and more than forty persons were on the ground applying for relief. It was a touching sight, as the poor, feeble and emaciated women, perhaps followed by several squalling children, or an old and decrepit man, who had hobbled miles, appealed for the love of God for assistance. We do entreat our people to give these poor people the thousands of dollars are about to be spent in celebrating the glorious deeds of a hundred years ago; and the descendants of the heroes of those days, the descendants of those whom Montrose and Frost and Armstrong fought to save, are crying aloud for bread. The merry-making of the present month will be an eternal reproach to us, if it be allowed to prevent any of us from giving what is in our abundance, we would give for the relief of the suffering Carolinians in Colleton and Beaufort. Let us care for our poor, and then we can celebrate Southern heroism with a clear conscience and a light heart."

PROFESSOR KIMBERLEY.

THE AMENDMENTS HOW TO BUILD OUR RAILROADS.

The eleventh article of the Constitution relates to punishments for crime, to the institutions provided for that purpose, and to State institutions for charitable purposes.

The only change in this article proposed by the amendments is made by adding a provision to the effect of authorizing all convicts, sentenced to hard labor, to be employed on public works or highways or other labor for the public benefit, and the farming out of the same where and on such manner as may be provided by law. No convict shall be so farmed out, however, who has been sentenced on a charge of murder, rape, attempt to commit rape, or arson.

The object of this amendment is plain to the common understanding. It is to save money, and at the same time to benefit the State by carrying on the public works of various kinds that are so much needed for the development of the resources of the State. Ever watchful of the interests of the people, the Democratic party last week in Convention assembled, pledged its strict administration of the State for the purpose of securing the completion of those great works of improvement that shall bring together in more intimate union the people of the East and the people of the West, thereby giving each section easy access to other markets than its own for the sale of its surplus products.

In some such disposition as this, he not made, of the criminals of the State they will necessarily have to be kept in confinement in our jails and penitentiaries and thereby entail upon the people the expenditure of vast sums of money for money for houses for criminals to live in and for food for them to eat, without any corresponding advantage to the State. The number of convicts consequent upon the present radical administration of the law is now so great that the tax upon the State for their keep and maintenance is no light burden and this must be so long as deprivation of personal liberty with or without hard labor is the penalty affixed by the law to so many crimes.

That it is a hardship thus to tax good men for the support of bad men is undoubtedly true, but like many other hardships of this life, it must be borne for the reason, if for no other, that it is cheaper for the good men to support criminals in confinement than to permit them to go at large. The good of the community absolutely requires that crime shall be punished at any cost, but at the same time common sense teaches that criminals ought to be made to earn their living, if it be possible, and to give the State the benefit of their labor of the criminals it is obliged to feed and clothe. That is all the change the amendments propose to make in this matter. Let them be ratified.

HANCOCK AND HENDRICKS.

The platform adopted at Cincinnati last week for the Radical candidates for President and Vice President to go before the country, is as a whole, a masterpiece of the distinctness with which it strikes one issue, as it is for the distinctness with which it seeks for another. The Democratic party asks power at the hands of the people upon the ground that it intends to bring about reformation, reform and honest government in the country, and that the Radical party intends to do so.

And just here, if it be wise, the Democratic party will learn a lesson for the guidance next week at St. Louis. The war issue is one that the Democratic party must make up its mind to meet squarely, and this it can do in no other way so effectively, as by nominating as its candidate for the Presidency, a man whose record in the Federal army during the late war in camp and in battle, is of such unmistakable character, as to give the lie to and for all time to come, to any and every imputation, come from what quarter it may, of affiliation with the hopes and plans of the traitors, and of the Confederacy. If our candidate's life and services in the cause of the Union be not so well known of all men at the North, as to carry an abiding conviction from the day of his nomination, that he is perfectly "sound" upon the vital sectional issue that drenched our country in blood, it will be idle for us to hope for success. If, however, we do nominate a man and that man disposes most effectively of the war issue, the Democratic party will be free to force the Radicals to meet it at the points and on the ground that they, as well as we, know to be fatal to them, that is to say, upon questions relating to reformation, reform and honest government.

From this standpoint it seems to us that HANCOCK is the man for the St. Louis Convention, HANCOCK and HENDRICKS and any platform that may be agreed upon will rarely be wrong.
