General News.

The Hon. J. Philip Roman, a prominent and wealthy citizen of Cumberland died suddenly in that place on the 28th of February...

The municipal election in Frederick city last Monday resulted in the triumph of the Republican candidate for Mayor by the following vote:

Thos. M. Hollbruner (Rep.) 920 John H. Bruner (Dem.) 734

The Republicans also elected their entire Algerian ticket by an average majority of 108; and four out of the seven members of the Common Council.

The Constituent Assembly of France has ratified the terms of peace agreed upon between the Emperor of Russia and M. Thiers, President of the French Republic.

The German troops have entered Paris in great triumph, while the Parisians are in deep gloom and mourning for the untoward event.

Letters of mutual congratulation have passed between the Emperors of Russia and Prussia. The Czar says that the happiness and glory of Russia are now insured.

THE NEXT GOVERNOR.—The next gubernatorial contest of Maryland promises to be unusually lively. On the Democratic side of the question, the following gentlemen have been spoken of as probable candidates for the nomination: Hon. Montgomery Blair, of Montgomery county; Hon. Ferdinand C. Latrobe, Hon. Robert T. Banks, and Wm. P. Preston, of Baltimore city; Andrew K. Syester, of Washington county, and Hon. Jas. C. Clarke, of Baltimore county.

Administration Meeting.

At a meeting of the friends of President Washington, and his administration of the affairs of the National Government, convened at the Court House in Frederick-Town on the 5th of September, 1792...

Dr. Joseph Stetson, of Piney Creek Hundred, was called to the Chair, and Capt. John McPherson, of Frederick-town, and Capt. Wm. Shields, of Tom's Creek Hundred, were appointed Assistant Chairmen, and George Beckenbaugh, of the Upper Monocacy, and Maj. Mountjoy Bayly, of the Manor, were selected Secretaries.

A committee consisting of John Ritchie, Esq., Abraham Faw, Casper Shantz, William Enmitt, Col. John Thomas, of the Merryland Tract, William Clements and Capt. Valentine Brother were selected to prepare Resolutions on the subject.

The Committee retired for some time, and returned and reported the following resolutions:

Resolved, That we repose unlimited confidence in the patriotism, sterling integrity and ability of George Washington, the tried patriot and sage; and we claim that by his wise administration of the domestic and foreign affairs of the nation, he deserves a unanimous re-election to the office which he now holds.

Resolved, That we deprecate the spirit of party and faction as inimical to the great interests of our favored country.

Resolved, That as the Maryland Line, and the old Flying Camp were among the first to go forward to maintain the cause of free government and the Rights of Man, we believe George Washington, who led our fathers and comrades on the plains of Trenton and Yorktown, at Lexington and Brandywine, deserves the cordial support of the Whigs of '76, and our support is hereby cordially tendered to him.

Resolved, That we approve of the nomination and selection of the following gentlemen as candidates for Electors: For the State at Large, His Excellency Thomas Sim Lee, Esq., Alexander Contee Hanson, Esq.

For St. Mary's, Charles and Calvert counties—John H. Stone, Esq.

For Anne Arundel and Prince George counties—John Hall, Esq.

For Harford, Cecil and Kent counties—Peregrine Letherberry, Esq.

For Caroline, Talbot and Queen Anne's counties—William Richardson, Esq.

For Dorchester, Somerset and Worcester—Levin Winder, Esq.

Resolved, That George Murdoch, Wm. Murdoch Beall, Maj. Peter Mantz, Colonel Philimon Griffith, Gen. John Ross Key, Capt. Henry Williams and John Gombey be appointed a Committee of Correspondence.

Resolved, That His Excellency Thomas Johnson be requested to convey a copy of the proceedings of this meeting to President Washington.

Resolved, That the proceedings of this meeting be published in Burgis's Federal Gazette and Winter & Cary's Rights of Man.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS MEETING. OFFICE OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS. Frederick, March 1st, 1871.

The County Commissioners for Frederick county, will meet at their Office, in the Court House, on Monday, the 3rd day of April next, at 11 o'clock, a. m., and have adopted the following order of business for their April Session:

- Monday, April 3d, District No. 1, Buckeys town; Monday, April 3d, District No. 2, Frederick; Tuesday, April 4th, District No. 3, Middle town; Tuesday, April 4th, District No. 4, Creagerstown; Wednesday, April 5th, District No. 5, Emmitsburg; Wednesday, April 5th, District No. 6, Caletown; Thursday, April 6th, District No. 7, Urbana; Friday, 7th, " " 9th, New Market; Friday, April 7th, District No. 10, Havers; Saturday, April 8th, District No. 11, Woodsboro; Saturday, April 8th, District No. 12, Petersville.

Monday, April 10th, District No. 13, Mount Pleasant; Monday, April 10th, District No. 14, Jefferson; Tuesday, April 11th, District No. 15, Mechanicstown; Tuesday, April 11th, Dist. No. 16, Jacksonville.

On Wednesday, April 12th, 1871, will appoint Collectors of State and County Taxes, Judges of Election, Physicians to the Jail, Keeper of Weights and Measures, and Keeper of the Court House and Yard.

The residue of the Session will be devoted to general business, such as passing accounts, making appropriations to Roads and Bridges, out-door pensioners, issuing commissions, trial of road cases, &c., and with the adjournment of the Session, the transfer books will be closed until after the Levy of 1871, is completed.

All persons interested in having transfers and abatements made, are requested to take particular notice of this order, if they fail to attend to the same, no deduction will be made on their assessments after the levy is made and completed.

Persons having accounts against the County will please present them so as to have them passed and placed on the levy of 1871.

By act of 1870, chapter 441, all accounts of officers, such as Sheriff, Register of Wills, Justices of the Peace, Coroners, Constables, and Attorneys, must first be submitted to and approved of by the Judges of the Circuit Court, before they can be placed on the levy. Those interested will file their claims with the Judges of the Circuit Court in time, so as to be placed on the levy of 1871, at this and their May session, if they fail to do so, their accounts will not be placed on the levy.

The above regulations will be strictly adhered to. Persons having transfers to make can do so before the Clerk of the County Commissions, at any time prior to the above meeting. By order, JNO NEED, Clerk. mar 4-tf
