

LOCAL AFFAIRS.

THE MARKET.—The market this week, owing to the cold, rainy and blustering weather, was not quite as brisk as last week; still considerable transactions took place in the lumber trade. Purchases were made quite freely for Emmitsburg and Crogerstown Districts, and other places. Lumber ranges from \$25 to \$25 per M. according to thickness and quality, which has declined from 5 to 10 cents per bushel, owing to the glut in the Eastern market, and not much offering; Hoopoles continue to arrive—butter, eggs and bacon, owing to the Easter holidays, are in demand—Dried fruit is passive. Potatoes still continue scarce and high. They are worth \$1.25 per bushel. The prospect of the fruit crop promises favorably, and the growing grain has a healthy, thrifty appearance, looking exceedingly well.

In the old times of Crogerstown, from 1810 to 1820, the Rev. Dr. Schaeffer, of the Lutheran Church, used to preach at that place, and at Easter Sunday, particularly, it was regarded as a great Festival and gala day. The Rev. Dr. Schaeffer usually stopped with Mr. Michael Ramick, one of the Elders of the Church. After him, from 1820 to 1826, the Revs. John Winter and Michael Wachter preached in this church, and they too generally stopped with Mr. Ramick, who always took good care that the preachers were well provided for. Mr. Ramick was a good liver, and loved to hear the Ministers of the Gospel expound the word of the living truth. At Easter time in 1822, the assemblage was very large, and the Rev. John Winter, according to the testimony of our old friend Cornelius Ridge, delivered a powerful sermon, which caused the tears to flow from many an eye, tears of joy and gladness.
