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LECTURES AT EMMITSBURG. Rev. Mr. Tittel, the Pastor in charge has been giving a series of sermons through the week in the Church of the Incarnation at Emmitsburg on the Passion of the Lord, yesterday, Good Friday, was celebrated in due form in remembrance of the Crucifixion. The whole service will culminate tomorrow in solemnities appropriate to Easter Sunday.

When to advertise—now. DEATH OF A VENERABLE MARYLANDER. Maj. Henry Schley, an aged and influential citizen, died at the residence of his son, Dr. Fairfax Schley, in Frederick, at midnight of Sunday, the 2d of April, after an illness of a few days, at the advanced age of 78 years. He was Adjutant of Col. Chambers' Regiment during the war of 1812, and served at Baltimore and Bladensburg. He commanded the Warren Greys, a volunteer uniform company of Frederick in 1824-28. In 1835, upon the death of his father, John Schley, he was appointed by Chief Judge John Buchanan, Clerk of Frederick County Court, a position he filled with much credit and satisfaction to the people of the county. He was also for many years the popular Cashier of the Frederick County Bank, Treasurer of the Frederick and Emmitsburg Turnpike Company, and filled other positions of usefulness. The latter years of his life were spent in retirement, in the enjoyment of affluence and of the universal respect of the community among whom he resided. Maj. S. possessed a wonderful knowledge and recollection of the old events of the county and the public records, and his death in this light will be regarded as a public calamity. To his immediate friends the loss will fall heavily. "But the Lord giveth and the Lord taketh away: blessed be the name of the Lord."

The writer of this many times ago published a short article in the Emmitsburg Star, in reference to the correct mode of spelling the name of the town. Having been misinformed from a source which should have been more sure of the facts in the case, an additional letter "T" was added. From that time St. Joseph's began the use of the two "T's," and gradually it became current. Frequent examinations since of the signature of William Emmitt and others of his kindred, invariably gave the spelling as above mentioned. The Irish patriot spelled his name Emmet. I have written the above to go on record as the correction of a mistake into which I was unintentionally led.
