**OBITUARY.**

At St. Joseph's Sisterhood, near Emmitsburg, on Friday, 25th of May, 1871, Sister BAPTISTA DOWD, of Cancer in the stomach. This estimable lady was born 10th December, 1814, in York, Pennsylvania. Her parents removed to St. Mary's parish near Emmitsburg, during the pastorate of the venerable John Dubois and the pious Simon Brute. Here she was raised with great care by a saintly mother, whose good example and religious deportment was the brightest and best legacy she bequeathed to her children. Mrs. Dowd is remembered affectionately by many as her mother, who told traits of her many virtues. Her warm friendship, noble generosity, and her sympathy with the poor and suffering. In the lovely month of May, 1831, a month when nature is clothed in green and is so prodigal of flowers, the air redolent with their sweet fragrance, this month of Devotion for all good Catholics to honor the Virgin Mother of Jesus, was selected by Miss Dowd to enter the Sisterhood at the Vale of St. Joseph's, to consecrate her virgin heart at the early age of sixteen to her Creator. Here in this valley of peace and harmony, she acquired all the virtues so necessary in a religious state. Her first mission of Charity in 1832 was to Philadelphia, where the cholera was at that time raging. She afterwards filled many important positions and died in her 57th year, thanking God for giving her the grace to die a Sister of Charity. Long will the good people of Portsmouth, Norfolk, Richmond and Point Lookout remember their kind friend, "Sister Babbey," as they familiarly called her. She really was the orphan's Mother, the Soldier's Nurse, and the friend in need. Persons of all ages could go to her, tell their troubles and trials into her ears, which were always open to sympathy and mercy, and come away comforted and relieved. She had not only received good advice, but was carrying with them a Sister's blessing, which influences many a heart to bear their own crosses more patiently. She died holding one of the highest offices in the Institution, being one of the four who regulated all the concerns of the Sisterhood.

In less than a year, the poor of this neighborhood have lost two good mothers and benefactresses—Sister Baptista Dowd and Sister Matilda Coskey. All who had the pleasure of their acquaintance loved them. They cheered every home they entered, and prepared many a soul to meet its God in judgment. A little over a year this Institution also lost by death, Sister Mary Olympia McTaggart, one of the most benevolent, charitable ladies I ever met. She accomplished more real good by her strong common sense, and her plain manner of dealing than by her superior talents and education. Dear Sister Olympia, your grave is famed by the cold winds of Lake Michigan, dying at the post of duty. You were not blessed by having the requiem sung over your corpse, by your companions, the devoted daughters of Charity, but your death was felt by them as sincerely as if they could have joined the solemn anthem. Sisters Matilda and Baptista are reposing under the shade of Mother Seton's monument, a fitting place for her second generation—the first having passed away. But three of the community of the Old School remain. Each of these have spent more than a half century as Sisters of Charity, and each have been crowned here on earth, but are now hoping to receive their Heavenly crown from their chosen Saviour and Redeemer, when it is his holy will to call them from earth to Heaven.

I have another death to record. Mother Augustine De Court died last August in her 86th year. She governed the Institution as Mother Superior for several years. Noble self-denying woman! May you all become bright constellations around the throne of your God.
