NOTICE.

Tax-Payers of 1871! Save Your Five Per Cent.

The Collector for Frederick county hereby gives notice that the Tax Books for Frederick county, for the year 1871, are made out and placed in his hands for collection, and he is ready to receive the respective amounts due by tax-payers. A discount of 5 per cent. will be allowed on all state tax paid before the first of September; 4 per cent. on all paid before the first of October; 3 per cent. on all paid before the first of November; and if not paid before the first of January, 1872, interest will be charged thereon.

Tax-Payers could do well to avail themselves of the Discount.

The Collector hopes that tax-payers will be prompt as demands upon him are urgent, and must be honored. On account of the stringent provisions of a law passed by the last General Assembly, the present Collector will not be able to give tax-payers the same indulgence which they have received from former Collectors; but will be compelled to insist upon it, and, if necessary, enforce payment within the year.

The delinquent tax-payers of 1870 are hereby notified that unless their taxes are paid by the 15th of August, 1871, the same will be collected according to law.
