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Mr. Lewis C. Ogle Dead.

Stricken While At Montevue Assisting With Butchering.

Tuesday morning shortly after nine o'clock, the sad news of the death of Mr. Lewis Calvin Ogle, of Creagerstown, was flashed over the telephone wires throughout the north end of the county.

Mr. Ogle went from his home in Creagerstown to Montevue Hospital early Tuesday morning, he having been invited to that place by his life-long friend, Commissioner Frank M. Stevens, to be present at the second butchering of the season on the Montevue farm.

Arriving at Montevue, Mr. Ogle went out and was acting in the capacity of helper, he showing no sign of illness and being in his usual jolly good humor. About 8.30 he complained of not feeling so good and went to the doctor's office to get a little medicine for indigestion. On going out to the men again he fell unconscious to the ground. He was picked up and carried into the building and expired in about fifteen minutes—the hour being 9 a. m.

Mr. Ogle was a son of the late George and Mary Ogle, of Creagerstown. For a number of years he resided on his large farm along the banks of the Monocacy river, but several years ago moved with his wife and daughter to the village of Creagerstown. Several years ago he was named as one of the assessors for Frederick county and in this and other ways he became known to a vast number of people in the county and elsewhere.

In politics Mr. Ogle was a staunch Democrat, but never held public office. He was a charter member of the Monocacy Valley Cornet Band, and a charter member of the Jr. O. U. A. M., of Creagerstown.

He was married to Miss Ella Martin, a daughter of the late Edward and Mrs. Celeste Martin of Thurmout, who with her daughter, Miss Beulah Ogle, survive him. Mr. Ogle is also survived by the following brothers: Bruce, Harvey, Grant and Robert Ogle.

Funeral services will be held today at 1 o'clock at the home, and interment made in the cemetery at Creagerstown, Md. Mr. L. Beard of Thurmout and Rev. S. R.
