

U. B. Church Rededicated. Edifice Crowded To Capacity At Services Sunday.

The United Brethren church, on Altamont avenue, which has undergone extensive improvements during the past few months, was dedicated to the worship of God last Sunday with impressive services morning, afternoon and evening.

To a crowded house in the morning, Rev. W. H. Washinger, A. M., of Chambersburg, Pa., and Superintendent of Pennsylvania Annual Conference, preached on the subject of "The All-Sufficient Christ."

The following are a few of the improvements made: Large addition to the front of the church, including bell tower and vestibule, memorial windows, new floor, walls studded and plastered, new pulpit furniture and rostrum, new seats with modern shape and design, steam heating plant, carpet, and beautiful frescoing.

The following ministers, in addition to Dr. Washinger and the pastor, Rev. Paul E. Holdcraft, assisted during the day: Revs. W. L. Martin, S. E. Rose, E. H. Hummelbaugh and H. O. Harner.

This congregation has enjoyed a splendid growth in recent years. Since assuming charge in 1912 Rev. Holdcraft received sixty members into the church, and all the other auxiliaries to the church are flourishing.

Rev. W. J. Marks, of Taneytown, preached Monday evening; Rev. S. E. Rose, of Thurmont, Tuesday evening; Rev. H. O. Harner Wednesday evening. The schedule calls for Rev. G. I. Rider Thursday evening; Rev. Charles Shaffer Friday evening, and on Sunday next Rev. A. M. Evers, of Hagerstown, afternoon and evening. Revival services will begin at that time. Rev. E. C. B. Castle expects to be present later.

After the Monday evening service the Christian Endeavor Society voted unanimously to have their pastor invite the Pennsylvania Branch Y. P. C. E. Convention to Thurmont in June next. This will mean the entertainment for three days of about 150 delegates and preachers interested in C. E. work. It is not known for certain if the convention can be landed for Thurmont as Red Lion, Pa., is also competing for it.

Rev. Holdcraft will preach every Sunday during the coming year, alternating the services afternoon and evening.

Successful Affair.

Last Saturday evening the Mite Society of the Methodist Episcopal church held Annual Hallowe'en Supper in Town Hall. The ladies report an unusual number of suppers sold and are much pleased with the net receipts from the sale of suppers, confections and fancy articles.

Washington, Nov. 1.—The White House today formally announced that President Wilson and Mrs. Edith Bolling Galt will be married "near the close of December." The following official announcement was made by Secretary Tumulty: "In order to quiet speculation, President Wilson and Mrs. Norman Galt today authorized the announcement that their marriage will take place near the close of December. Their plans are for a very simple ceremony. It will be quietly performed at Mrs. Galt's residence. No invitations will be issued, and it is expected that the only guests will be the members of the two families."

The limitation of the guests to the members of the two families comes as a disappointment, but no great surprise, to Washington society. Since it was definitely determined some time ago the wedding would be at the home of the bride, it was realized the guest list would of necessity have to be small. The home of Mrs. Galt would scarcely accommodate more than 50 persons. It is likely, however, that the wedding will be followed by an elaborate reception at the White House.
