**Many More Bills Signed.**  
 Governor Still Holding Some  
 Until Next Week.

Governor Harrington signed a large  
 number of bill Tuesday of this week, a  
 number of very important measures be-  
 ing included. There remain about forty  
 which he is holding under consideration,  
 most of which he is inclined to veto. He  
 will act upon the remaining bills Wed-  
 nesday of next week, April 26th.

Among the important bills signed this  
 week were those creating the State Le-  
 gal Department, the State Board of Pen-  
 ital Control, the Board of Moving Picture  
 Censors, the Conservation Commission,  
 the Bureau of Statistics and Labor and  
 the Department of Legislative Refer-  
 ence, and companion bills abolishing the  
 offices whose duties will be absorbed by  
 the new departments; reducing the paid  
 membership in the State Roads Commis-  
 sion from six to three, and abolishing the  
 State Wharfinger and the State Fire  
 Marshal, and providing that the work  
 now done by the Fire Marshall's office  
 shall be performed by a man in the office  
 of the State Insurance Commissioner.

Among other important measures sign-  
 ed were the Mothers' Pension bill, the  
 Governor holding that the ambiguous  
 language which provides a levy of one-  
 tenth of one mill to pay the pensions was  
 not sufficient reason for vetoing the bill,  
 and that the courts should be given an  
 opportunity to construe the provision  
 containing that language.

He also signed the bill providing that  
 widows shall share a larger share of the  
 estates of husbands who die intestate;  
 the Educational Survey Commission's  
 bill, which reforms the system of school  
 administration and carries a provision for  
 compulsory education; the bill providing  
 a uniform system of accounting in State  
 offices, State institutions and State-aid  
 institutions, and a uniform fiscal year for  
 the same; the bill authorizing a compro-  
 mise of the indemnity claims against the  
 State arising from the condemnation of  
 oyster lands in Somerset county; the  
 Blandford Lime bill; the bill putting State  
 aided institutions upon a per capita basis;  
 the \$3,000,000 Roads and Bridges Loan  
 bill; the bill providing a registration day  
 before primaries, except in Baltimore  
 city; the \$1,000,000 School Loan and the  
 \$2,000,000 Conduit Loan bill for Balti-  
 more city; the bill giving \$2,000 to Fire  
 Marshall Myers for the loss of his eye  
 while performing his duties; the bill re-  
 vising the general incorporation laws; the  
 bill abolishing discounts on tax bills; the  
 bill increasing liquor licenses \$100; the  
 bill increasing the cost of traders' li-  
 censes, and the bill fixing the State tax  
 levy.

 Uniform taxation for incorporated  
 towns.

 Prohibiting sale of liquor in Woodville,  
 Frederick county.


