

EAST END CITIZENS OPPOSE WORKHOUSE

Tell Congress That Location Hurts Property.

The East Washington Citizens' Association, through its secretary, A. F. Sperry, has sent to the Senate and House Committees on District Affairs, a copy of resolutions in relation to the correctional institutions of East Washington, on which it is expected a special committee will be granted a hearing. The resolutions follow:

"Whereas the value of property and

the extension of improvements in the eastern part of the city are seriously impaired and retarded by the location of the workhouse and other correctional institutions in that section;

"And whereas steps are now being taken for the reclamation of the flats and the improvement of the Anacostia River, which will make the plateau east of the Capitol, as was originally intended by the founders of the city, one of the most desirable sections for residential purposes;

"And whereas capital is now being invested and attractive improvements are now being made in the vicinity of and east of Lincoln Park, but restricted by reason of the contiguity of these correctional institutions;

"Therefore, be it resolved by the East Washington Citizens' Association, That we earnestly protest against any extension of these institutions in their present locality, and against the contem-

plated additional appropriation for the enlargement of the present workhouse.

"And be it resolved, That we, as property holders, ask for the relief, which any other portion of the city would claim, of the removal of this incubus from our midst, to the end that we may fairly compete with them in our efforts to improve and beautify that section of the Greater Washington lying upon the banks of the Anacostia River.

"And be it further resolved, That copies of these resolutions be forwarded to the Committees upon the District of Columbia of the Senate and of the House of Representatives, to the Commissioners of the District, and to the Board of Charities."

When the Senate convened this morning, Mr. Gallinger, acting chairman of the District of Columbia Committee, offered the resolution. It was read and referred to his committee.

OMAHA WOMAN KISSED BY COW IN COURTROOM

Disputed Ownership Question Quickly Settled.

OMAHA, Neb., Dec. 3.—Probably the most unique testimony ever offered in a court room was that by Mrs. Emma Houghman, of South Omaha, Saturday night.

Charles Epstein claimed ownership of a Jersey cow. Mrs. Houghman had him arrested and brought replevin proceedings simultaneously.

When the case was called for trial Mrs.

Houghman asked that the cow be brought into court. Judge King permitted it, and Mrs. Houghman called the cow by a pet name.

Immediately the Jersey walked over to her and kissed her by rubbing her muzzle against Mrs. Houghman's face.

Three times this act was repeated, and Mrs. Houghman was declared the owner in consequence of its success.

TO BE KNOWN AS DAVIS AND ELKINS COLLEGE

Senator and ex-Senator of West Virginia Give Subscriptions to Presbyterian Institution.

CUMBERLAND, Md., Dec. 3.—At a meeting of the trustees at Elkins, W. Va., Saturday, it was decided to name the college to be located at Elkins, the Davis and Elkins College. It will be under the control of the Presbytery of Lexington.

Ex-Senator Henry C. Davis, who was elected president of the trustees, and Senator Elkins each subscribed \$50,000, with the proviso that the presbytery should raise \$30,000. The trustees accepted the offer of Senator Elkins of a site.
