WASHINGTON MEN CHOSEN FRATERNITY OFFICERS

George H. Lamar Elected President of Alpha Tau Omega.

CHICAGO, Jan. 3.—All but two of the forty-five chapters of the Alpha Tau Omega fraternity were represented by active members at the last session of the eighteenth biennial congress of the organization held yesterday at the Auditorium Hotel.

Indianapolis, Ind., is now the labor headquarters of half a million union American and Canadian workmen. This great force of labor includes the United Mine Workers, the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America, and the International Typographical Union.

Trade unionists of Milwaukee, Wis., are up in arms against the Retail Grocers' Association because of the efforts being made by the latter to bring about a laboring which shall make it possible to garnish 10 per cent of the wages of a debtor.

The National Association of Manufacturers is willing to work with labor organizations for the abolition of the contract convict labor system in every State of the union, and will urge a systematic joint campaign in the Legislature of every State which is not now protected.

Trade unionists of North Carolina declare that the State reports regarding child labor in the cotton mills of the State are grossly misleading. According to State statistics there are about 8,000 children employed in the mills, but the unionists claim that 25,000 would be a nearer estimate.

It is a curious fact about Cuban strikes that, however little grievance one body of workers may have, it is likely to show its sympathy for other bodies in rebellion by leaving work. If the disturbance continues for a sufficiently long time all of the laboring classes may leave their employment.

Jackson, Miss., had a brief street car strike recently. The trouble lasted only half an hour, but the tie-up of the system was complete while it lasted, and it is the second time that the employees have been victorious with the company. The strikers objected to the action of the superintendent in discharging two motormen.

Referendum ballot by the United Association of Journeymen Plumbers, Gas, and Steam Fitters of the United States and Canada has decided that after January 1 the dues shall be increased to 30 cents a week. The project for equalizing the matter of sick, death, strike, and superannuated benefits was adopted. There has been no uniformity in this matter and some locals paid no benefits.

Arrangements have been made for a joint conference of the ironworking crafts affiliated with the allied metal trades, to be held in Pittsburgh, Pa., January 10. The conference is called to discuss the changes required in the wage agreements of these various ironworking trades for the coming year.

Veterans in the service of the Oregon Railroad and Navigation Company will be benefited by the introduction of a pension system to apply to those employed continuously for twenty years or more and who have reached an age necessitating retirement therefrom. The amount of pension to be paid any employee will depend upon the length of his continuous service with the company and his average monthly salary during the last ten years thereof.
