FLANAGAN TO TRY FOR WEIGHT-THROWING RECORD

John Flanagan, weight thrower, shot putter, and policeman, is entered for the weight events in the Greater New York Irish Athletic Club games at Madison Square Garden on March 14, and thinks that he will be able to beat Mitchell's record of 15 feet 6 1/2 inches for the fifty-six-pound shot for height. He thinks, too, that unless he is too heavily handicapped he will have no difficulty in winning the weight-for-distance event.

ETON STUDENTS EXPELLED, SCANDALOUS OFFENSES HINTED

LONDON, Feb. 16.—It is learned that eight students at Eton, who are sons of the most aristocratic families in Great Britain, were recently expelled. Most of them were in the sixth form.

EACH HARTFORD FUTURITY HEAT TO BE A RACE

Most Liberally Arranged Event in Horseman's World.

The management of Charter Oak Park has announced the conditions of the Hartford Futurity, value \$15,000, for foals of this year, which will close April 1, with an entrance fee of \$5 per mare.

The total starting fee will aggregate but \$35—less than 1/4 of 1 per cent, which makes the Hartford Futurity the most liberally arranged race in the history of both the running and trotting turf.

A marked innovation on old-time colt racing methods is introduced. The race is for three heats, a mile each, each heat a race, with \$2,500 to first and \$500 to second colt in each heat. A money winner distanced in a subsequent heat gets the money it won. In case of a dead heat, the money is divided. At the end of the third heat \$4,500 more will be divided among the starters, according to their standing in the summary—\$3,900 to first, \$1,000 to second, \$500 to third. In case two or more colts are tied for first, the tied colts alone will get it off.

OLYMPIC GAMES FOR ST. LOUIS WORLD'S FAIR

International Committee Decides to Transfer Them From Chicago for the Year 1904.

The Washington Press Bureau of the St. Louis World's Fair has been advised through a cablegram from Hon. Michael Lagrave, World's Fair commissioner general of France, that the international committee on olympic games has definitely decided to transfer these games in 1904 from Chicago to St. Louis, in order that they may be made a feature of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition.

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PRIEST KINDLY BAILS OUT TERRY M'GOVERN

Little Fighter Arrested for Boxing on Sabbath.

MANAYUNK, Pa., Feb. 16.—Sergeant George Dunlap and a squad of police raided the training quarters of Terry McGovern at Kebrugh's Road Drivers' Hotel, yesterday morning, arresting Terry, his brother Hughie, Joe Humphreys, and Pete Kennedy. "Crocket" Boyle escaped through a window.

At usual, Terry attended early mass at St. Bridget's Roman Catholic Church, after which he took a five-mile run before breakfast, and about 10:30 he sought the stable to work out with his sparring partners. "Crocket" Boyle was the first one up and boxed three rounds, followed by Pete Kennedy.

At this juncture Sergeant Dunlap made his appearance and was readily admitted by the doorkeeper, who was told that the crowd was under arrest for violating the blue laws against Sunday work and promoting a prizefight.

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GOLFERS TO MEET AND CHOOSE LINKS

Will Select Site for Championship Contests Tomorrow.

NEW YORK, Feb. 16.—The important feature in the golfing world this week will be the annual meeting of the United States Golf Association, which is to be held at Delmonico's tomorrow evening.

The rules of golf as revised by the committee of the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrew and interpreted by the American committee, with their ruling, will doubtless be adopted without a single change, and the officers named by the nominating committee will be unanimously elected.

The chief interest will be centered in the disposition of the three championships, and especially the women's event, which is wanted by both the Chicago Golf Club and the Atlantic City Country Club. The women do not desire to go West, and will present a petition asking that the championship be decided upon an Eastern course, on the ground of the great majority of the competitors being Eastern women, and there being so few Western women who could even qualify for a championship event.


