CITY BREVITIES.
 Henrietta Ross, a negro, aged twenty-one years, tried to kill herself yesterday by swallowing a small quantity of laudanum. She was conveyed to the Emergency Hospital and her life was saved. The girl refused to assign any motive for the act.

A peculiar accident was brought to the notice of the Emergency Hospital physicians yesterday. Seven-year-old Wander Stabler, of 117 Twentieth Street northwest, was admitted to the institution suffering with a swollen finger on which a thimble had become fastened. The thimble had slipped over the knuckles, and could not be removed, causing the girl intense pain. It was filed from her finger.

Arthur Johnson, a negro aged forty-five years, fell from a oyster pungy at the Eleventh Street wharf last night, and was drowned. The man had been sitting on the stern of the boat, when he lost his balance. He was a well-known character about the wharves.

PERMIT REVOKED FOR AUTOMOBILE STABLE

Corporation Counsel Holds It Was Improperly Issued.

A. B. Duvall, Corporation Counsel, has submitted his opinion relative to the revoking of the license for an automobile stable at the corner of Eighteenth Street and Rhode Island Avenue. Application was made for a permit to erect the building by George Howard, attorney in fact, for Miss Alice L. Riggs. Acting on the advice of Mr. Duvall, the Commissioners issued the permit.

Building operations aroused the people in the vicinity against the project. They asked for a hearing before the Commissioners, which was granted, and numerous objections were presented to having such a station in a locality devoted entirely to quiet homes.

Mr. Duvall again took the matter under advisement. It was learned that the full purpose of the proposed station was not stated in the application for the permit, or, at least, was so stated that the real object did not appear. This object was to establish a storage and renting station, and a repair shop, as well as a place in which to sell road vehicles.

This object was found to be a direct violation of section 21 of the Police Regulations, and accordingly Mr. Duvall advised the Commissioners that they have authority to revoke the permit.

Steps were immediately taken to notify Mr. Howard of the new phase of the case, and the Commissioners today issued an order revoking the permit.

OHIO SCHOOL TEACHERS HERE AS SIGHTSEERS

All Points of Interest to Be Taken In By Visitors.

A large party of school teachers from northern Ohio arrived in Washington last night to spend the week in viewing the sights of the National Capital. The train bringing the party was made up yesterday in Pittsburg, the teachers having reached that city over several lines, including Cleveland, Painesville, Ashtabula, and other town on the lake shore. The route to Washington was by way of Harper's Ferry and Cumberland. The party is under the guidance of Prof. R. P. Clark, superintendent of schools, of Ashtabula, Ohio, and the train arrangements under the direction of W. W. Boyd, of Columbus.

The teachers have a well-defined itinerary, including a half-day at the Capitol, two evenings at the Congressional Library, trips to Mount Vernon and Arlington, ascent of the Washington Monument, visits to the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, Smithsonian Institution, Army and Navy Museum, Fish Commission, Pension Building, Treasury, War and Navy Departments, and the White House. Some of the afternoons and evenings will be devoted to visiting friends and going to the theaters.

The headquarters of the excursionists is at La Petra's Hotel.

ONLY ONE LICENSE NEEDED BY BUILDERS

Question Settled By District Law Officer.

Arthur H. O'Connor, Assistant Corporation Counsel, has submitted two opinions to the District Commissioners on the question of what constitutes a "contractor" under the provisions of the license law.

In the first case the question was raised whether a builder must take out a license for each trade represented, such as woodwork, bricklaying, and plumbing. Mr. O'Connor decides that the occupation of builder, and the license therefore, covers all the trades included.

In the second case, Mr. O'Connor was called upon to define what is meant by the term "electrical contractor." He holds that the character of the work should determine whether the contractor should have more than one license.


