

UNIQUE CELEBRATION ON AN OLD BATTLEFIELD

Monuments Unveiled to King's Mountain Heroes.

Many States Represented

Big Gathering of Descendants of Old Soldiers Near Greensboro, N. C.

GREENSBORO, N. C., July 4.—There was a unique celebration in the old Guilford Court House battlefield near here today. It consisted of the unveiling of the monuments to several heroes of the battle of King's Mountain, by the descendants of the men to whom the shafts were erected, and the descendants of the men who served under them. Another monument to Washington was dedicated. There was an address by Col. E. C. Henderson, of Tennessee, and short speeches by some of the descendants. A number of visitors from other States were in attendance.

The scene of the celebration is also unique in that it is the only battlefield in the United States which has been bought and set apart at private expense as a memorial. The field is five miles from Greensboro, the latter town, by the way, being named after the commander of the American troops in the fray, Gen. Nathaniel Greene.

Company Formed

The importance of the battle has always been recognized, but it remained for public-spirited citizens of Greensboro, under the leadership of Hon. David Schenck, to make active efforts to secure the land on which it was fought as a permanent memorial.

The "Guilford Battle Ground Company" was accordingly incorporated March 7, 1887, with an authorized capital of \$25,000, in shares of \$25 each.

To raise funds to purchase, reclaim and beautify the grounds upon which the battle of Guilford Court House was fought March 15, 1781, Judge Schenck being elected the first president.

Many Improvements

The first act of the company was to purchase the site of the battlefield, about seventy-five acres.

As funds have been forthcoming this land has been beautified by clearing out the undergrowth in the forests, by sowing the waste fields in cereal crops, grasses, and by marking the site of the principal events with appropriate monuments.

The old roadways, long unused, have been restored as they were in 1781.

A large building in which to hold public meetings, a lodge for the keeper, and a museum for Revolutionary relics, have been built. A lake of clear water, numerous springs, protected by neat spring houses, and shaded walks and drives, add to the natural attraction, until today this battlefield is one of the most interesting places in the State, and instills its lessons of patriotism into the hearts of thousands of visitors from home and abroad.

Maryland Monument

One of the first monuments to attract the attention of the tourist is that of William Hooper, a native of Boston, whom Adams calls "one of the three foremost orators and statesmen of his day," whose remains, with that of a fellow-signer of the Declaration of Independence from North Carolina—John Penn—have found a last resting place in this memorable spot.

General Sumner, a native of the State, who fought bravely through the war, is also buried here.

Members of the Maryland Historical Society, through the efforts of Edward Graham Daves, of the Harvard class of 1854, have honored the memory of the First Maryland Regiment by tablets of bronze set in a huge granite block.

Boy Honored

The North Carolina volunteers, a small body of whom, under Major Winston on the left wing of the first line, held their own throughout the fight and were the last men to leave the ground, are commemorated in a bronze statue of a minute man, set on a granite pedestal, on the spot where they maintained the fight so long.

This was the gift of ex-Governor Holt. Gillies, a drummer boy, who was fatally killed by Tarleton's dragoons, after the battle, has a lasting memorial in bronze, the gift of the students of Oak Ridge Institute, a large boys' school nearby.

British Relics

Fair-minded men love to honor a brave foe, and the British Colonel Stuart, of the Guards, is recalled by a stone marking the spot where he fell, his sword, beautifully chased, with the coat of arms of the Biantyre family of Scotland, was found on the spot some years ago and is now in the Battle Ground Museum.

The permian tree, near which Cornwallis' horse was shot from under him, is still standing, and is called to the visitor's attention by a suitable inscription.

A bill passed the House of Representatives last year appropriating \$10,000 for monuments to Generals Nash and Davidson, and an earnest and successful effort has been made to have them erected on the battle ground. Efforts have also been made to have the remains of General Greene removed to this spot, fit resting place for the real victor of this battle, for the event proved the wisdom of the Earl of Chatham's remark, when Cornwallis' victory was announced: "One more such victory will ruin the British army."

BRADY'S PROJECT REJECTED

PARIS, July 4.—The municipal council has rejected all propositions to grant concessions for the supply of gas in the city of Paris to foreigners, notably the so-called American scheme of MM. Devulz and Duchanoy, who, it is alleged, represented Anthony N. Brady, the American capitalist. The council decided on a municipal monopoly of gas.

FOR LOWER POSTAGE ON MANUSCRIPTS

Society of American Authors Renewing Its Crusade.

The Society of American Authors has again opened its crusade against the comparatively high postage on manuscripts mailed by authors, newspaper correspondents, and ministers in the United States to other points in this country.

The present charge is 2 cents an ounce. And yet, if these same authors wish to mail their manuscripts to the most remote parts of the world, they can do so at the rate of 1 cent for every two ounces, or four times more cheaply than they can mail to points within the United States.

Also, the same writers, if living in the remotest parts of the world, or to make the statement more striking, just across the border in Canada, can send their manuscripts to points within the United States at the rate of 1 cent for every two ounces, or four times more cheaply than they could if residing within the United States.

A committee consisting of Poultey J. Digelow, Orlando J. Smith, Isaac K. Funk, M. P. Ferris, George C. Lorrimer, Charles Burr Todd, Samuel P. Avery, and G. Grosvenor Dave, has sent out circulars explaining the situation and saying that the society hopes to obtain the introduction of a bill simultaneously in both Senate and House at the next session of Congress. The committee asks that those interested in the movement notify the secretary, Mr. Dave, and send the names of others likely to be contributors as they wish, to help carry on the large amount of correspondence necessary in the cause.
