

BASEBALL ELBERFELD ENJOINED. BOXING AL ORTH AFFLICTED WITH A TIRED FEELING. RACING LITTLE GIRL'S FILLY LOSES. ATHLETICS WATCHED HIS WIFE TAKE POISON TO DIE

ELBERFELD IS TIED UP BY AN INJUNCTION

New York Court Restrains the Little Shortstop From Playing With the New York Club—Comiskey After Davis' Scalp.

Rube Waddell Reconsiders His Decision to Jump the Athletics and Is Once More Back on the Team.

Supreme Court Justice Truax yesterday granted a temporary injunction restraining Norman Elberfeld from playing with the Greater New York Baseball Club, of the American League.

The injunction was issued on the motion of Lawyer Sullivan, representing the New York National League club.

A month ago Manager Barrow, of the Detroit club, suspended Elberfeld without pay. Nearly every club in the big leagues began to bid for the shortstop's services.

The Cincinnati peace conference decided that Elberfeld belonged to the Detroit club and must play there.

Davis signed an iron-clad contract drawn up by John M. Ward, his attorney, with the Chicago American League two years ago.

The Senators will have an opportunity today of duplicating their Cleveland record and break even with the Tigers.

Waddell, the Athletics' star and erratic pitcher, has returned to the team, and will play out the season.

Manager Mack announced yesterday that Daniel Hoffman, the substitute outfielder, had quit the team, and is believed to have gone to Los Angeles, Cal., to play in the outlaw league.

There will be no West Point-Annapolis football game next fall either on Franklin Field or anywhere.

That was the statement made yesterday by a member of the army-navy football committee, which has been trying since December to adopt a code of eligibility rules which would be satisfactory to both sides.

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
