WELCOME TO CARDINAL A NOTABLE OCCASION

Large Washington Contingent Gone to Baltimore for the Day.

A delegation of Catholics numbering more than 200 left Washington today over the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad for Baltimore, where they will join in the reception to his eminence, Cardinal Gibbons, upon his return from Rome. Twenty-one pieces of music from the Elizabeth's Band, under the leadership of J. B. Caldwell, were engaged to accompany the delegation, and before the departure of the train this afternoon, the band played a series of lively airs.

By an arrangement made by a special committee appointed for the purpose, badges differing from those to be worn by Baltimoreans today were provided for the Washington men. The local badge was a neat red ribbon with "Welcome to our Cardinal" in gilt letters, and a white ribbon with "Washington." The emblem of the delegation was an American flag draped in the papal colors and flying streamer with the word "Washington."

Capt. Matthew Goddard was chief marshal for Washington, and had for his aides John R. Galloway, John T. Callaghan, W. J. Frazier, Dr. C. E. O'Connor, J. H. Clippner, W. D. Slaughter, Lawrence Mangan, J. Blake Clark, A. C. Jay and J. H. Lannan. It is understood 19,999 people will be in the line today in Baltimore to greet the cardinal. The Washington delegation expected to arrive in Baltimore at 2:30. The cardinal's carriage, containing his eminence, Bishop Curley, and the Rev. P. C. Gavan, chancellor of the diocese, and the cardinal's conclavist, will drive near the head of the line. Immediately behind the carriage will come the Catholic Benevolent Legion, and then the delegation from Washington. When the procession reaches the cathedral the cardinal will occupy a specially constructed platform and review his escort. The cardinal will then enter the cathedral, where he will make a short address. A specially prepared musical program will be sung by the combined choirs of the cathedral and St. Mary's Seminary.

SEASONABLE FOOD SUPPLIES ON MARKET BENCHES.

Today being a market day, a larger supply of vegetables and fruits was on hand, brought from Maryland and Virginia. The dealers in vegetables and fruits are, however, depending more and more on shipped supplies as the fall comes on, and in consequence the Washington market is controlled largely by the shippers. Tomatoes are scarce and will probably take a jump in price before long. Sweet potatoes are to be found in large quantities on the benches now. Lima beans, which have been affected by the wet season, are comparatively high.

The supply of fish was a shade better today than it was yesterday. More Potomac bass are coming into the market, and bring from 20c to 25c a pound. The price of fish has been very high the last week, and a drop is expected as soon as the facilities for getting more fish have been re-established. Trout, small blues, and panfish are taking a good share of the trade.

The outlook for meats this season is not bright from the economic standpoint of the housekeeper. The wholesale dealers keep their prices high and close to the figure set by the retailers, so that the latter have small chance to cut their prices.

SALVADOR WILL PAY TRIUNFO CLAIM AWARD

Company Will Give Receipt in Full for Two-Thirds.

Dispatches from Salvador announce that the finance committee of the Salvadoran congress has approved the compromise agreed upon in settlement of the famous claim arising out of the forfeiture of El Triunfo Company's charter.

Last winter the Salvadoran congress refused to appropriate \$500,000 to pay the award made to this company by a commission composed of Senor Pecos, of Salvador; Chief Justice Strong, of Canada, and Don M. Dickinson, representing the United States. Three weeks ago the company entered into an agreement with attorneys for Salvador to take two-thirds of the award in immediate settlement of the claim.

The acceptance of this compromise by Salvador will settle a controversy which threatened to compel the United States to send a gunboat to Salvador to collect the money due American citizens from that government.

WABASH BREAKS GROUND IN WASHINGTON COUNTY

Line to Waynesburg to Be Completed by January 7, It is Hoped.

WASHINGTON, Pa., Sept. 24.—Ground for the construction of the Greene county line of the Wabash Railroad was broken yesterday afternoon, a mile and a half southwest of here. Today operations were begun just over the line in Greene county.

Wabash engineers are on the scene, and are laying out the entire route between this place and Waynesburg, a distance of twenty-five miles, and work will be rushed.

It is expected to have the line between Washington and Waynesburg completed by January 1.

JUDGE P. S. GROSSCUP MAY RESIGN OFFICE

Has Lucrative Offer to Argue Northern Securities Case.

Dispatches from Chicago say Judge Peter S. Grosscup, of the United States district court, has been offered a position as attorney for the Northern Securities Company, and is considering the proposition, and that his resignation is likely to go to President Roosevelt in a few days. The offer to Judge Grosscup is said to be unusually attractive. Not only would the fee be heavy, but Judge Grosscup would be given an opportunity to add greatly to his reputation in appearing before the Supreme Court in the great struggle which the Northern Securities is about to make.

In making its last stand, the company will spare no means and will employ the finest legal talent obtainable. Judge Grosscup received the offer shortly after the company was defeated in the courts at St. Paul. He is regarded as an authority on anti-trust litigation, because of his decision in such cases as the prosecution by the Government to check rate cutting, and the one in which he decided the Chicago beef combine was a combination in restraint of trade.

IMMIGRATION BUREAU UNDER INVESTIGATION

Investigation of charges against the Ellis Island Immigration Bureau has been begun by the commission recently appointed by President Roosevelt. Eugene A. Philbin is chairman of the commission. Yesterday the commission spent the day on Ellis Island, examined the New York detention room, visited the "excluded" room, and paid close attention to the registration of immigrants and the questions and answers accompanying registration.

ONE HUNDRED DEMERITS FOR CADET IN ONE MONTH

One hundred and ten demerits in two months. This is the remarkable record established by Chatham Wilson, of Savannah, Ga., at the United States Military Academy. Wilson entered the academy in June and was dismissed in August. As cadets are seldom given demerits in their first month at the academy, Wilson's remarkable demerit record may be said to be for one month.

BANK LOSES OPTION ON ELIGIBLE SITE

American Security and Trust Company Gives Up Fourteenth Street Corner.

The option held by the American Security and Trust Company on the site at the northwest corner of Fourteenth and G Streets expires today without a purchase having been consummated.

The company has abandoned the idea of acquiring the property, because it has bought the site at the northwest corner of Fifteenth Street and Pennsylvania Avenue for the erection of a new building. A sacrifice of \$7,000, the price of the option, is made by the change from the original plans.

The option on the G Street property was purchased on the belief that the present building occupied by the company would be enlarged so as to cover the entire corner at Fourteenth Street. The owners of the property offered to sell for approximately \$175,000. The option held active until September 24.

In the meantime the company decided to buy the other piece of property as a building site. The purchase price was \$300,000. With this action, the plan of enlarging the present structure was abandoned altogether, and the officials of the company decided to sacrifice the sum paid for the option.

The building now occupied by the company will be sold as soon as a purchaser may be found. It is valued on the books for \$250,000.

The bids for the construction of the new building have nearly all been received, and the contract is to be awarded in a few days.
