POLICE QUELLED ANGRY STOCKHOLDERS' RIOT

Meeting Called by New York Building Loan Banking Company Stampeded.

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—Threats and accusations made by 200 stockholders of the New York Building Loan Banking Company against the officers of that concern yesterday resulted in the arrival of a squad of reserve policemen, who were summoned to quell the disorder and prevent bloodshed in the offices of the company, where a special meeting had been called.

It was contended that inasmuch as the company was in the hands of a receiver its officers had no legal right to call the meeting, the announced purpose of which was to vote a stock assessment of 20 per cent.

Hundreds of angry stockholders were unable to get into the room where the meeting was held on account of lack of space. They had an overflow meeting outside the building, and Fifth Avenue was almost blocked by the crowd.

When as many as possible had entered the room J. P. Eustace, brother of Mark Eustace, a former contractor of the company, declared that the charge of insolvency made against the company was false.

JUDGE URGES JURY TO INDICT WRIGHT

LONDON, Oct. 20.—The recorder, in charging the grand jury at the Old Bailey yesterday, advised finding a true bill against Whitaker Wright, the company promoter who was extradited from New York July 29 to answer charges growing out of the failure of the London and Globe Finance Corporation, Limited. Commenting on the "notorious" character of the defendant, the recorder said he hoped the facts which had been disclosed would serve as a "solemn warning" to persons of higher position against lending their names to commercial enterprises of which they had no practical knowledge.

PORTO RICO OFFICIALS INDICTED AS SMUGGLERS

SAN JUAN, P. R., Oct. 20.—The Federal grand jury has found an indictment against Collector of Customs Alonzo Cruzen, for receiving unlawful emoluments of smuggled goods, and against Capt. Andrew Dunlap, U. S. N., commandant of the naval station here, and Robert Gilman, a former contractor in Porto Rico, for smuggling. District Attorney Pettigill immediately nolleed the indictment against Mr. Cruzen with an indorsement stating that it was based on false and "corruptly fabricated" testimony and instigated by spite and revenge.

ACCUSED OF THEFT OF OVER \$100,000

OAKLAND, Cal., Oct. 20.—City Marshal Rummage, of Hayward, has arrested William Ward, an inventor, on a charge of being a defaulter in the sum of over \$100,000. The arrest was made on evidence submitted by H. B. Erickson, of San Francisco. It is charged that Ward was a confidential clerk in a bank in New York, and while acting in that capacity stole over \$100,000, which was surrendered on a woman. It is claimed that he fled from New York and came to California.

DIVORCED COUPLE EXCHANGE SHOTS

KINSTON, N. C., Oct. 20.—A sensational shooting affair occurred eighteen miles from here yesterday afternoon, in which Mrs. Richard Ward and Cook E. Stroud exchanged shots, wounding each other. Mrs. Ward is Stroud's former wife. Mrs. Ward, whose husband was in the Government service at Philadelphia, was visiting here, and went to the home of Stroud, from whom she was divorced two years ago. She demanded possession of her children. Stroud refused to give them up. A quarrel ensued, when both shot at each other.

CORONER'S JURY SHOWS SYMPATHY IN VERDICT

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 20.—Isaac Morton came to his death from a gunshot wound in his head, from a gun found in his own hands, supposed to be accidental. "This is the verdict of the coroner's jury in the death of Isaac W. Morton, one of the leading citizens of St. Louis. He was a millionaire philanthropist, and wielded a great influence in municipal and State affairs. He was a member of the St. Louis Chamber of Commerce, and the coroner of St. Charles county, after the verdict was rendered, said that, while he and the jurors felt that the man had taken his own life, they had been actuated by sympathy in making the death appear accidental.

GORDON M'KAY DIES IN NEWPORT VILLA

NEWPORT, Oct. 20.—Gordon McKay, who revolutionized shoemaking by his sewing machine, an invention from which he made many millions, died in his villa in Marine Avenue at noon yesterday. By his will Harvard University will come into an inheritance said to be \$4,000,000. Heretofore measures had been taken for several weeks to retard the progress of a man from which Mr. McKay was suffering. Dr. William T. Bull and other New York specialists were called into the case, but it was apparent several days ago that the end was near. The patient was kept under the influence of opiates to alleviate his sufferings.

LORENZELLI TO BE MADE A CARDINAL

PARIS, Oct. 20.—"Le Petit Parisien" publishes a dispatch from Rome in which it is said that Monsignor Lorenzelli, papal nuncio here, will be promoted to a cardinal, in spite of the failure of the French government to recommend such promotion.

GOVERNMENT SEIZES CRUISER CHATTANOOGA

Vessel Taken From Jersey Sheriff's Hands to Prevent Its Sale at Auction.

TRENTON, N. J., Oct. 20.—Thomas J. Alcott, United States marshal, yesterday seized for the Government the cruiser Chattanooga, now building in the Crescent shipyards, at Elizabethport. The seizure was made on a writ of replevin obtained in the United States circuit court by United States District Attorney Courtland Parker, Jr. The complaint of the Government was that irreparable injury would result if the sale of the Chattanooga, scheduled for today, were allowed to proceed. The Government has expended \$500,000 on the cruiser and \$500,000 is necessary to be expended to finish her.

WOMAN HATER WEARS AFTER MANY YEARS

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Oct. 20.—After thirty-five years of silence, as far as speaking to women, was concerned, William Van Note, who has become known among his neighbors as the "Kingston woman hater," was married to Mrs. Mary Miller, of Justice of the Peace Wolf, in New Brunswick, N. J. Van Note is fifty-five years of age, and up to the time he met Mrs. Miller he had said he would never speak to a woman. Mrs. Miller was a widow, and it wasn't long before Van Note had forgotten his vow. He is a wealthy farmer, living a few miles from New Brunswick.

FAIR SPANISH MAIDEN TO PLAY CARMEN HERE

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—Rosario Guerrero, famed abroad as actress, singer and dancer, is expected to arrive here today. She comes to play "Carmen," in which she created a sensation in Paris. It was two years ago that this pretty Spanish woman was first asked to visit America. She then refused, saying she was engaged to a wealthy American in Paris. He was jealous of her, she explained, and had objected to a visit to New York, pointing to the temptations that befall pretty dancing girls here. She was sued on a contract, but the court favored her.

ITALIAN CRUISER HERE; ABRUZZI IN COMMAND

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 20.—Commanded by Prince Luigi Amedeo of Savoia-Aosta, Duke of Abruzzi, the third-class Italian cruiser Liguria arrived here yesterday. The Liguria has been cruising in tropical waters for some time and is stopping here on her general round of visits. She is the first Italian warship to visit New Orleans in many years. The duke is widely known as an explorer, his expedition in 1900 having gone farther north by twenty-two miles than Nansen's did.

EMIGRANT SHARKS ARRESTED IN PARIS

PARIS, Oct. 20.—The police say they have ended the operations of a band formed to rob emigrants going to the United States by arresting yesterday morning, John Knowley, of New York, Lavarelli, a Swiss, and Fondaric, an Italian. The latter plan was to become acquainted with intending emigrants and by various methods obtain money from them. The complaint on which they were arrested was that of Jean Guiduli, who was on his way from Milan to New York.

HIS HEAD SEVERED BY ELECTRIC WIRE

SCRANTON, Pa., Oct. 20.—Mervine Basseligo, a resident of Peckville, this county, late Saturday night started out to look for two missing cows. He did not return, and early this morning a party set out to look for him. His body was found in a field, decapitated. Basseligo had run against two electric light wires. One he took in his hand, and the other one this morning he severed the other one. This circuit, it is claimed, and in some manner one of the wires got under his chin, and severed the head. He was married, and middle-aged.

JOHN MORLEY DEFENDS BRITISH FREE TRADE

LONDON, Oct. 20.—John Morley, M. P., the former Liberal chief secretary for Ireland, who has been in retirement while writing his "Life of William Ewart Gladstone," returned to active political life last night and took his place in the fighting line against the protectionist policy of the present government. Speaking at Manchester, Mr. Morley aroused immense enthusiasm by an eloquent and spirited attack on the new policy, against which he declared, he was arrayed with the whole weight of authority, both practical and theoretical.

U. S. MINISTER BRYAN GOES UP IN BALLOON

PARIS, Oct. 20.—Charles Page Bryan, the United States Minister to Portugal, was a passenger yesterday in Santos-Dumont's latest airship, known as No. 10, during a test flight. First they went up about sixty feet and made some evolutions while the balloon was held by a rope. Then they descended, took in Misses Mackey and Taylor and made a short free ascension.

CARNEGIE IS GIVEN FREEDOM OF WATERFORD

Thousands Who Have Been in His Employment Praised in a Speech.

DUBLIN, Oct. 20.—The freedom of the city of Waterford was bestowed on Andrew Carnegie yesterday. In his speech of thanks Mr. Carnegie said he was proud to be associated on the roll of freedom with John Redmond and John Dillon, two patriots who are doing what they think is best for their country, according to their lights. Mr. Carnegie paid a tribute to the tens of thousands of Irish people who had been in his employ, saying he always felt proud when they said they "liked the little boss." "Emigration to America is now lessening," he went on, "and I am glad to know that Ireland, after long centuries of misfortune, is about to march forward on a brighter path. A large measure of justice has recently been given to Ireland, which I trust is only the precursor of more to come."

BANK \$69,000 SHORT; CASHIER IN PRISON

PRINCETON, Wis., Oct. 20.—J. E. Leimer, cashier of the Princeton State bank, has been arrested and taken to jail, charged with forging and embezzlements aggregating \$69,000. State Bank Examiner Marcus G. Bergh says that Leimer has made a confession to this effect, saying he had spent the money in grain speculation. The Princeton State bank is closed, and the Montello State Bank, of which Leimer is vice president, and the heaviest stockholder, has been ordered by the State officers not to open its doors for business.

RECEIVERSHIP GRANTED ON BOARD PILOT BOAT

Officers and Directors of Wrecked Mexico Company Search for Chancellor at Sea.

DOVER, Del., Oct. 20.—Chancellor Nicholson this morning appointed James H. Hughes receiver for the International Bank and Trust Company of America, whose bank was closed in Mexico City. The appointment of Hughes was agreed upon by all sides. Last night officers and directors of the embarrassed company set out from Lewes in boats to find Chancellor Nicholson, who had gone to sea on the pilot boat Philadelphia. The chancellor was finally located and the receivership granted. As the company is a corporation of this State it is believed that the receivership granted by Chancellor Nicholson will supersede a similar action in the Republic of Mexico, where Don Jacinto Patterson, a lawyer, has already been appointed by Mexican authority.
