These books have been placed in all drug stores and when called for should be issued to good citizens who may desire them."

## MANY GRADE CHANGES IN CALIFORNIA AVENUE

Berry & Minor, attorneys for Mrs. E. H. Stevens, of 215 California Avenue northwest, have complained to the District Commissioners because of recent changes made by the District Engineer Department in the roadway and grading in front of Mrs. Stevens' premises. The attorneys say a grade was established on the street before the house was built, but that three changes have been made since then, and that Mrs. Stevens has expended \$3,000 trying to keep the front yard sodded and in good condition. The grade is now ten feet lower than when first established, and the attorneys claim the value of the property has suffered materially as a consequence. The complaint is in the hands of the Engineer Commissioner for his consideration.

## NEW SPECIFICATIONS FOR MILK SUPPLY BIDS

Conforming to a recent request of Commissioner West, Health Officer Woodward has drafted a new set of specifications to govern bids for supplying milk and cream to the various institutions of the District. When bids were called for on the former specifications only one competitor responded, the complaint being made by other dealers that the standards set by the District were too high to be considered by the milk dealers. The new specifications are different in that they do not specify any standard, but allow the bidders to state just what sort of milk and cream they care to furnish for a certain price. As soon as these specifications are approved by the Commissioners bids will be advertised for and another attempt made to place the milk supply under contract.
