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DOLLS' GLASS EYES ON DUTIABLE LIST

Treasury Decision Imposes Tariff of 60 Per Cent Ad Valorem.

In the United States Treasury decisions under the tariff, internal revenue and other laws just published, importers of glass eyes for dolls are informed by the appraiser that this class of goods is dutiable at the rate of 60 per cent ad valorem.

The appraiser also rules that a duty must be collected on small lithographically printed religious pictures inclosed in metal frames with glass fronts.

Under the customs decisions contained in the report, mail packages forwarded to the United States through the United States post office at Shanghai, China, are admitted to the mails subject only to the payment of duty.

Then, because we have the gift of gratitude, in the inspiration which we desire to give thanks. For he is doubly blessed who can both see the gifts that come, and is ever grateful to the hand that brings them to him.

Above everything, among the things not thought of, our nation should be grateful to God for the work and influence of the Christian Church, which through the everlasting Gospel, in its unobtrusive way, ever developing itself, has been the power of the Republic, and is the one power given of God for the accomplishment of the world's mission.

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FOUND WOMAN DEAD IN HER STATEROOM

Passenger on Steamer Adirondack Is Thought to Have Committed Suicide.

ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 21.—When the ticket collector on the steamer Adirondack, of the People's Line, was making the rounds of the staterooms about 8:45 o'clock this morning to collect the tickets of the passengers who had not yet vacated, he could get no response from room 288.

Procuring a pass-key, he entered and turning on the light found the body of a woman, apparently about forty years of age, lying dead on the berth. The body was fully clothed with the exception of shoes and was still warm, showing that the woman had been dead but a short time.

The woman boarded the steamer at New York last night and gave the name of "Miss Gordon" to the purser. On the fly leaf of a hand dictionary in a small grip, the woman's only baggage, was written the name, "E. C. Gordon, Philadelphia." The remains were removed to a local undertaking establishment and Coroner Schapp will investigate.

"MOTHER" EDDY ROBBED OF MANY VALUABLES

CONCORD, N. H., Nov. 21.—The residence of Mary Baker G. Eddy, the founder of Christian Science, was broken into last night and many articles of value, including gifts from her followers, were taken. The three front rooms, containing most of Mrs. Eddy's treasures, were ransacked, and the stolen goods carried off in a rug of great value, which was taken from the parlor floor.

The burglary was done by one man, whom the police were able to track through the fields beyond St. Paul's School, where he took to the road and all trace of him was lost.

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FRENCH GOVERNMENT NOT TO BUILD EMBASSY

Plan for Permanent Home of Minister in Washington Has Been Temporarily Abandoned.

Hope that a mansion for the French embassy in this city will be constructed has been abandoned for the present, in spite of the fact that the French government purchased a lot near Sheridan Circle, and that plans were made for the building, the committee on foreign affairs in the French government has reported adversely on the demand for a credit of \$2,000 for the Washington embassy.

Its report was on the ground that the budget was overcharged, that economy was essential, and that there was no urgent reason for the immediate beginning of such a building.

M. Jusserand, the French ambassador, is pleased with his present place of residence, but there had been some hope that the government would make arrangements to have its own embassy.

AMERICAN YOUNG WOMAN WITHOUT A SUPERIOR

High Words of Praise Spoken by Member of Moseley Commission.

SCRANTON, Pa., Nov. 21.—Counselor John Whitburn, of Glasgow, a member of the Moseley commission, which has been making an investigation of the industrial and educational conditions in the United States, came to Scranton yesterday and made an address at the Scranton High School.

The English high schools, he said, were as good as any he found here, but this country is far ahead of any in the world in elementary education. He was, he said, unable to understand the success of coeducation in this country.

He was amazed at what he had seen in the manual training schools of this country. The sight of young men and young women working side by side in these mechanical schools, using the chisel and hammer with equal proficiency, was one to startle a person not familiar with conditions.

Mr. Whitburn paid a fine tribute to the American girl, who, he said, is without a superior.
