CITIZENS ARE DIVIDED ON FALLS ROAD PLAN

Associations Generally Have Indorsed Scheme, and Only a Few Property Owners in M Street Object.

Citizens and citizens' associations are taking advantage of the invitation recently issued by the District Commissioners to express opinions relative to the proposed new street car line to be established by the Great Falls and Old Dominion Railroad Company. The citizens' associations, judging from the letters received, are all in favor of the road, and have pledged their support before the committees in Congress.

As for the citizens, some are for the road and some are against. The Central Labor Union, representing 18,000 workmen living in the northeast and southeast sections of the city, has gone on record as a champion of the new road, on the ground that the two sections mentioned will be greatly benefited.

Letters of protest are mostly from property owners along M Street, which is the line of the proposed road. The reasons given are usually personal loss by decreasing the value of their holdings. The argument of those in favor of the road is "the greatest good for the greatest number," regardless of individual profit or loss. The following letter was received by a prominent Washington firm:

"The undersigned, owning the Augusta apartment house, located on the southeast corner of New York and New Jersey Avenues northwest, desires earnestly to urge your honorable body to allow the Great Falls and Old Dominion Railroad to run its cars through M Street and New Jersey Avenue to the Union Station.

"This section of Washington lacks suitable railroad facilities. While it is true the Washington Traction Company's line passes through New York Avenue, yet it is a notorious fact that because of its suburban nature and poor schedule, it is not able or certainly does not give a proper city service."

CAUSTEN APPOINTED COLLECTOR OF CUSTOMS

James H. Causten, of the State of Washington, has been appointed collector of customs in Porto Rico. He will succeed Collector Cruzon. Mr. Causten will sail on Saturday for his new station.

Mr. Causten has nine years' experience in customs work on the Puget Sound.

Mr. Cruzon resigned after a number of charges against his administration by a special agent of the Treasury. The charges were first published in The Times last spring, but no action was taken for about two months, when the Treasury gave out a summary of the special agent's report. Afterward Mr. Cruzon resigned.

KELIHER WILL KEEP HIS SEAT IN HOUSE

Elections Committee No. 1 of the House has unanimously decided the Conry-Kelisher contested election case from the Ninth Massachusetts district in favor of Mr. Kelisher, the sitting member.

Both men are Democrats, and come from the strongest Democratic district in the United States, embracing Faneuil Hall, in South Boston. Each received over twice as many votes as the Republican candidate.

The question between them was largely one of regularity, neither having received the regular Democratic nomination by reason of a deadlock in the convention. Mr. Conry has served one term in the House. The decision of the committee is unanimous in favor of Mr. Kelisher.
