The remarkable showing made by the Georgetown crew at the big intercollegiate regatta on the Hudson last June, when it finished second to the Cornell giants, and decisively defeated Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, Syracuse, and Columbia, greatly popularized rowing at the University on the Heights. The decision of the officials of the regatta is assuming a definite aspect. Crack Dempsey has as a nucleus for the varsity crew which will race at Poughkeepsie six members of last year's crack eight. Atkinson, the stroke; Captain Bremner, No. 7; Curran, No. 6; Hayden, No. 4; Graham, No. 2, and Shepard, bow, are available, and Coach Dempsey expects to find among the new candidates two men who can acceptably fill the seats left vacant by Russell, who graduated, and Teavan, who did not return this year. The average of the material this year is better than it has been since Coach Dempsey came to the University, three years ago, the candidates being heavier and the form of the men showing a marked improvement over previous seasons at this time. The decision of the officials of the Rowing Association to send a crew to compete in the college race at the American Henley on Decoration Day is an added incentive for the aspirants for aquatic honors. In this race, besides Georgetown, there will be Harvard, Pennsylvania, Cornell, and Columbia. The dual regatta with the navy will be held on the Severn River on May 21. The first crews will meet in a two-mile race, while the second eight will fight it out over the mile and half course. Last year all four crews started in the same event, and Georgetown finished one, two. At Poughkeepsie on June 27 the Blue and Gray will meet Wisconsin, Cornell, Syracuse, Pennsylvania, and Columbia in a four-mile race.

Basketball Averages Have Been Announced

Corcoran Cadets Lead With .857--Handiboe Best Goal Thrower With 94--Vernon Next With 78--Shedd Had 24 Fouls.

The past season in the National Guard Basketball League was by far the best and most interesting in the history of basketball in Washington. A week before the end of the season, three teams the Corcoran Cadets, First Battalion, and Urell Rifles, were tied for first position, with eleven games won, and three lost. The Urells and First Battalion had it out, and the Urells won. In the meantime the Corcorans had defeated the Ordway Rifles, and the championship was not decided until the last game of the league schedule was played.
