

"HONORABLE TIM" CAMPBELL DEAD

Noted Wit, Politician, and Lawyer Gone.

POPULARITY HAD NO BOUNDS

Funny Incidents in Which the Former Representative from New York Figured.

Timothy J. Campbell, formerly a Representative in Congress from New York whose death from pneumonia occurred yesterday, was for many years a prominent figure in the life of the East Side.

"The Honorable Tim," as Mr. Campbell was called by his friends, was a noted wit, and enjoyed great popularity, not only among his East Side constituents, but elsewhere in New York city, in Albany, and Washington.

Downed by Croker. After he entered politics, early in life, he believed in allowing nothing to balk his ambitions, and he had his way until 1854, when Richard Croker ordered his humiliation.

Many stories told about "Tim" may be imaginative, but here is one which he admitted was true. It was toward the end of his term in Congress, in February, 1883, and a select party of constituents visited him at his home in New York.

"Who's that, Tim, and what's he doing?" inquired a member of the party. Campbell was puzzled, but he felt that his reputation depended on his answer.

"Sure, I've forgotten his name for the moment, but I can tell you what he is. It is the statue of the man who invented roller skates, and that's one of them he has in his hands."

Everyone was satisfied and the procession passed on. Whichever way active he didn't believe in letting anything balk him, not even the Constitution of the United States.
