Folk Sentiment Sweeps Missouri Like Cyclone

Machine Politicians Bow Helpless Before Popular Storm Which Threatens to Demolish Them With Boodlers of St. Louis.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 11.—Joseph W. Folk, anti-boodling candidate for governor of Missouri, is sweeping the State against the organized forces of corruption. Every indication points to his nomination by the State convention, to be held at Jefferson City, July 19.

Returns to the present time indicate that Folk has thirty counties and 143 votes; Hawes has the city of St. Louis and one county, 112 votes; Reed has six counties and 23 votes; Judge Gantt has neither county nor vote.

Three-Cornered Opposition. Against him is arrayed a three-cornered opposition. Harry B. Hawes, ex-police commissioner of St. Louis; Mayor James A. Reed, of Kansas City, and Judge Gantt are the leaders of this opposition.

From the Iowa line to Arkansas, from St. Louis to Kansas City, has arisen the cry of the hoodlers convicted through Folk's efforts out of the State penitentiary. This has been effected through legal technicalities.

TAKES PHOTOS IN ALL COLORS

Prof. Wood, of Hopkins, Secures Patent. HAS NO COMMERCIAL VALUE

Can Be Made Only on Glass Slides, and Special Viewing Apparatus Is Required.

BALTIMORE, Md., April 11.—Dr. Robert W. Wood, professor of experimental physics at Johns Hopkins University, has announced that after five years' investigation by the Patent Office he has received a patent covering all rights to the fundamental invention of the process of color photography by means of the Rowland spectroscopic diffraction grating.

Dr. Wood says that no method of color photography has any commercial value. His patent upon the fundamental theory will protect his rights upon the derivative inventions. The process at present is valuable purely for its academic significance. The photographs cannot be made on paper, but only on glass slides and a special viewing apparatus or electric lantern upon a screen must be used to get the optical results.

PLAN TO SETTLE COLORADO SPIKES

Federation of Labor Will Attempt It. COMMITTEE GOING TO SCENE

An attempt will be made by the American Federation of Labor to put an end to the mine and other strikes in Colorado. While the Federation is not empowered to bring the strikes to a close, the leaders are of the opinion that they may be able to settle some of the difficulties.

Some of the troubles in the Silver State have been going on for nearly two years, and the loss in wages to the employees and to the owners has amounted to many millions of dollars.
