## BARNUM AND BAILEY'S SPLENDID SPECTACLE

### Replica of Gorgeous Durbar at Delhi Feature of "Greatest Show on Earth."

### Eugenie Blair Gives a Good Performance of "Sapho."

An audience which filled every available seat in the Lafayette Opera House was present last night to see Eugenie Blair's production of the much discussed play, "Sapho." While somewhat different from the Netherese version, Miss Blair has retained the interest of the piece and judging from the applause her Sapho made a powerful appeal to the emotions of her audience.

The first act shows the fete at Dechelette's where Jean and Fanny meet. Fanny's arrest for forgery brings it to an abrupt close. The staircase scene in the act is omitted. The second act gives opportunity for a refreshing bit of comedy work in which Jean's country relations visit him at his rooms. It is only for a brief space that the tension is relieved, for in the next scene the gloom begins to deepen. Jean learns of Fanny's past life. He turns against her. From that moment until Fanny's final farewell the play is full of passionate intensity.

Miss Blair's acting of Sapho showed an undeniable talent and much emotional power which carefully avoided the excesses that a less capable actress might have been led into. By her excellent restraint she served to bring out the role in its better aspects. Her Sapho was less banal than that of Miss Netherese.

As Jean an excellent impersonation was given by Mr. Keenan, whose personal appearance and well modulated voice gave him an unusual advantage. With him as with several others of the company there was a hesitancy about the lines which showed that the parts were still being learned. Miss Huxford, Du Barry appeared as Mme. Hettina, and Mr. Walsey as Dechelette. Sapho will continue on the boards for the rest of this week.

### Two Students at Gothenburg Ostracized by Faculty for Act "Offensive to Society."

COPENHAGEN, April 19.—A great scandal has been caused at the Swedish University of Gothenburg by Miss Garling, a woman student, and Fritshof Palmer, a student, announcing in the local papers that they had concluded a "conscience" marriage—that is to say, one without legal ties.

Miss Palmer has been cut by her family, and the rector of the university has publicly declared the action of the young couple as offensive to society.

Four hundred students of both sexes and several university teachers have, however, protested against what they call the rector's unjustified interference.

## QUEEN'S DREAM GREAT SUCCESS

### Second Performance of Mrs. Barney's Extravaganza.

Admirals Dewey and Schley and Many Others From Official Life Interested Spectators.

## PRESIDENT WAS DELIGHTED

The house which greeted the amateur performance of Mrs. Barney's play yesterday afternoon was scarcely less brilliant than that of a week ago, when there was a gala air about it. Flags draped about the first floor and tier of boxes more than made amends for the lack of brilliant costumes seen on the first night, and the performance was Secretary Moody, of the navy, and Admiral Dewey were prominent figures near the front of the theater, and their presence was a fitting tribute to the cause for which the benefit was given.

Every spectator dropped into his seat, scanning the boxes for President Roosevelt and his party, and was rewarded by the President's hand one of the first to arrive at the theater.

Mr. Roosevelt sat in a left hand box downstairs, and wholly unconscious of the hundreds of eyes riveted upon him, left his seat repeatedly to shake hands with friends in the audience, and stopped for a little conversation with the French ambassador and Mme. Jusserand. With him were Mrs. Roosevelt, wearing a charming white hat and gown, and Miss "Barrow, his sister-in-law, in a party gown, trimmed in richings of white and wearing a black lace hat with white roses.

Secretary Moody was with the President's party, and Rear Admiral and Mrs. Taylor were their guests. When the Marine Band played "The Star-Spangled Banner" the President stood up in his box, and his movement was followed by all other spectators, until the national anthem was over, and everyone stood to hear the patriotic hymn. The Secretary of State and Mrs. Hay occupied a box just back of the President.

Admiral Dewey Present.

Admiral Dewey occupied a box well to the front of the theater, and was accompanied by Mrs. Dewey, wearing a gray gown and a toque of white with silver trimming. The Peruvian minister and Senora Calderon also occupied a box, the beauty of the minister calling for almost as much admiration as the charming dancing of her daughters on the stage.

Miss Wilson, daughter of the Secretary of Agriculture, was with a party of friends and wore a gown of pale yellow, embroidered all over and trimmed with blue and red, and wore a pink and cream white hat.

The British ambassador and Lady Durand were conspicuous figures, and showed their interest in the parts taken by Miss Durand and the other distinguished people present.

# Love Again Laughs at Parental Objections

## Leonora Flint Leaves Home in New Brunswick, N. J., Joins A. J. Birney in Washington, and Becomes His Wife.

A pretty romance extending over two years culminated in Washington this morning in the marriage of a young couple at St. Patrick's Church. In the romance are all of the usual elements, including parental objection on the part of the father of the young woman, and flight from home. The principals in the affair are A. J. Birney, a young railroad man of Washington, who resides with his parents in the Home apartment house at Seventh Street and Massachusetts Avenue, and Miss Leonora Legrande Flint, of 128 Albany Street, New Brunswick, N. J.

Mr. Birney and his family are Catholics, and the young woman's family are Baptists. Miss Flint was a school teacher and a member of the choir of the First Baptist Church of New Brunswick. Mr. Birney and Miss Flint met three years ago. They have been engaged, despite all obstacles thrown in their way, for more than two years.

In all that time they have been endeavoring to win the approval of Miss Flint's father to the match. Finding this impossible they decided to wed without it.

Mr. Birney could not get away to New Brunswick, so arrangements were made by mail. Miss Flint quietly resigned from her school and night before last she left her father's house, getting a friend to telephone home for her that she intended to remain for the night with young girl acquaintances in Highland Park, one of the suburbs of the town. Miss Flint then made her way to the station, boarded a train, and reached Washington at 4:30 o'clock this morning.

Mr. Birney met her and took her to his mother. Arrangements had in the meantime been made by Mr. Birney for the ceremony, and at 11 o'clock they were married. A little wedding trip was begun this afternoon.

The disappearance of Miss Flint from New Brunswick created considerable excitement, as she is well known there. There were reports of an elopement, in which rumor had it that Mr. Birney had gone to the New Jersey town and had brought the young woman here.

"There is no truth in the elopement story," said Mr. Birney this morning. "We have been quietly preparing for the ceremony for many months. I have not been in New Brunswick since last August.
