PREFERRED STEEL UNDER PRESSURE

Stock Loses in Early Dealings, But Rallies Later.

ONLY A FEW STOCKS ACTIVE

Trading Sentiment More or Less Listless and Most Fluctuations Merely Nominal

NEW YORK, June 7.—The stock market opened extremely soft. The declines were fairly general, but as a rule small. Only a few stocks were active. Ontario and Western lost 1/2, Steel preferred lost 3/4, and Great Western reacted 1/2. Other fluctuations were entirely nominal.

COMMISSIONERS' NOTICES.

EXECUTIVE OFFICE, Commissioners of the District of Columbia, Washington, June 3, 1904.—ORDERED: That section 6 of the Plumbing Regulations is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Street and Wall Washers. Section 55. (a) An approved street washer or hose attachment must be located within the parking space on parked streets, or as close to the building line as practicable on unparked streets, if there is no cellar or basement.

(b) Where there is a cellar or basement under a building and connections to a wall washer can be made entirely within such cellar or basement, an approved wall washer must be located on the wall of the building. In all other cases the said attachment must be located as provided for in paragraph (a).

If a street washer is located in a parking or sidewalk, it shall be connected with at least two (2) feet (including 8 inches of slack) or three-quarter-inch A.S. lead pipe.

"All new street washers, hose attachments, and wall washers must be of material and construction approved by the Engineer Commissioner." HENRY B. MACFARLAND, HENRY L. WEST, JOHN BIDDLE, Commissioners of the District of Columbia.
