

EASBY-SMITH WILL SUCCEED GORDON

Assistant District Attorney to Take New Berth.

AT DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

Pardon Attorney Will Take Place at City Hall—Regret at Severing Relations.

Assistant District Attorney Peyton Gordon and James S. Easby-Smith, pardon attorney, in the office of Attorney General Moody, will exchange official positions on September 1.

Within the past few days Mr. Easby-Smith tendered his resignation to Attorney General Moody, to take effect September 1.

Immediately upon the receipt of Mr. Easby-Smith's resignation Mr. Moody wrote Mr. Gordon a letter notifying him of his appointment as pardon attorney.

In his letter accepting Mr. Easby-Smith's resignation, Mr. Moody said: "My relations with you have been brief, but sufficient to make me feel that the good opinions of my predecessors of you were justified. I wish you success in your new field of duty."

Regrets His Departure.

District Attorney Beach when seen at his office this morning said it is with great reluctance that he sees Mr. Gordon sever his connection with his office. During his service as Assistant United States District Attorney, Mr. Beach said Mr. Gordon has always been a faithful and efficient prosecutor, and the good results of his work before the local courts speak for themselves, and will always be a testimonial as to his ability as a lawyer.

Since Mr. Gordon was appointed to office by Justice Ashbel M. Gould, then United States attorney for the District, he has made many friends, who will miss him at the City Hall when he enters upon his new line of work in the Department of Justice.

Among the many important criminal cases in the trial of which Mr. Gordon took part are the James Butler murder case; John R. O'Connell and Arthur W. Perry, who robbed Thomas F. Walsh's residence; Eva DeVeal, manslaughter; Ada Cross, the notorious ne'er-do-well housebreaker; and William Moxley and George Bruce, two rice-tracker touts, who representing themselves as employees of the late William C. Whitney and August Belmont, procured money from Dr. Elmer C. Hyde, to bet on a horse named Woodstock, owned by the Columbian Stable.

Considered for a Month.

The exchange of official positions by Messrs. Gordon and Easby-Smith has been under consideration for a month or more by District Attorney Beach and Attorney General Knox. The retirement of the latter from office, however, necessitated a hold-up in the transfer until Attorney General Moody had the affairs of the office well in hand.

Mr. Easby-Smith is well spoken of by those who know him at the City Hall, and will no doubt be cordially received by all connected with the District Attorney's office, and the members of the District bar in general.

MRS. HURST DIES OF INJURIES.

ALBANY, Ill., July 28.—Mrs. Charles Hurst, of Brooklyn, N. Y., who, in company with her husband in an automobile going to St. Louis, was struck by a train here last Friday, is dead. Her body will be taken to New York for burial. Mr. Hurst will also be taken to New York, as he is improving rapidly.







JAMES S. EASBY-SMITH.

James S. Easby-Smith was born in Tuskaalosa, Ala., in 1870, when his father, formerly a member of Congress, was president of the University of Alabama at that place.

His parents removed permanently to Washington when he was a boy, his mother being a native Washingtonian, and he has lived here ever since. He was graduated from Georgetown University in 1891, subsequently took the degree of A. M., and studied law at the Georgetown Law School, being admitted to the bar in 1894. The same year he married Lillian, daughter of the late Frank Strong of Arkansas, and has a son and a daughter.

He was appointed an examiner in the Department of Justice July 1, 1893, and attorney in charge of pardons October 16, 1898. He was held in high esteem by the attorney generals under whom he served, and although a Democrat remained in the department under four Republican attorney generals because

of his ability and fidelity to duty.

At a recent meeting of the faculty of the Georgetown Law School he was elected a member of that body.

Editor of Paper.

Ever since his college days, when he was editor of his college monthly, he has been a hard student, not only of the law, but with a decided leaning toward higher literature.

The year he graduated he published his first poem, and in 1901 verse translations of the Greek poems of Alcaeus, with a life of the poet, and valuable critical notes. Both these works have received wide recognition on account of both their poetical and scholarly merit.

He was selected by Attorney General Knox to prepare a digest of the laws and decisions on pardons and the civil effects of conviction, authorized by Congress to be published for the Government, and has lately published a brief history of the Department of Justice from 1789 to 1901, which is understood to be only an epitome of a more exhaustive and elaborate work which is completed and will be published in the future.

PEYTON GORDON.

Peyton Gordon was born in Washington, D. C., April 26, 1870. He was educated in the public schools of this city and Columbian University Law School where he received the degree of LL. B. in 1890, and the degree of LL. M. in 1891. He was admitted to the District bar in October, 1891.

Immediately upon his admission to the bar he entered upon the practice of law and was associated with the late Milton C. Barnard.

He was appointed Assistant United States Attorney April 23, 1901, by the Hon. Ashley M. Gould, whose place he took in the office upon his appointment as United States Attorney, and entered upon the performance of his duties May 1, 1901.

Mr. Gordon has tried many important criminal cases with marked success, and has attended to a mass of very important civil business for the Government. He was married June 4, 1902, to Miss Evelyn Briley, of Cambridge, Md. His home is at Gaitersburg, Md.

THIEVES ENTER HOME AND STEAL JEWELRY

Among them were several pieces of jewelry in the second-floor room. Detective Cornwell is working on the case, but has no vice.

COURT DISSOLVES ORDER.

In the suit of the Riggs National Bank against Annie E. Smith and others, Justice Wright today dissolved the temporary restraining order, made against Mrs. Smith, Saturday last, enjoining her from withdrawing a certain fund from the American Security and Trust Co. The amount involved in the litigation is between \$1,500 and \$1,600. J. J. Lorington appeared as counsel for the defendant.

INHUMANITY CHARGED IN WIFE'S DIVORCE SUIT

Emma F. Stoner, who says her husband, James D. Stoner, has treated her "with systematic and continuous brutality" and with such "cruel and inhuman treatment" as to endanger her life and health, today began proceedings against him for limited divorce.

She says they were married February 4, 1886. On Easter Saturday, 1902, Mr. Stoner says her husband in a drunken rage stabbed her in the abdomen with a pen knife. Since that time she says he has choked her, she believed with intent to seriously injure her or take her life.

On two occasions she says he struck her on her mouth and each time knocked out one of her teeth. Edward L. Gies is named as counsel for the complainant.

THE TRIAL SET FOR TUESDAY

Indicted for Assault Upon Miss Laura Knode, Near Harpers Ferry.

Williams, the negro who stands indicted for committing criminal assault upon Miss Laura Knode, near Harpers Ferry, on the afternoon of June 27, is in jail here under guard of two companies of State troops, Company K, of Clarksburg, Captain Osborn, and Company G, of Kingwood, Captain Pierce.

These companies arrived here about 8 o'clock this morning with the prisoner. Sheriff Bilymer and Deputy Sheriff Nichols also accompanied him. The trial will take place on Tuesday next. The crime is punishable in this State with death.
