AMATEUR SCULLER WILL BECOME PRO. CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Feb. 18.—If Frank B. Greer, the national amateur sculler, is anxious to break into the professional rowing game he will be joyfully greeted by several well-known professionals, who have made their mark in aquatic circles.

A few weeks ago Greer announced that he had decided to turn professional, and that he would like to get on a race with Jim Wray, of Harvard, or other cracker. Nothing has been heard from Wray as yet, but Jim Rice, coach of the Weld club, of Harvard, and formerly coach of the Detroit and Toronto clubs, has come forth with a deft to the effect that he will take on Greer, at three miles, and row him for \$1,000.

An effort is now being made to bring the men together, and the chances of Greer feel confident that the race will be rowed the latter part of May on the Charles River.
