GATES MAY HOLD TRUMPS IN WHEAT

In a Position to Bother Mr. Armour. CHANCE FOR COUP IN JULY

Packer Has Taken on Many Bushels in Face of Ideal Crop Conditions.

CHICAGO, April 24.—The grand rush to get out from under the May wheat deal, engineered by the Gates party, continued its nerve-racking course on the Board of Trade this morning. That option opened at 98 cents, a 2-cent break from Saturday's close, and, under the stimulating influences of the shouters for help, steadily bore away for the bottom, selling at 92 1/2 at 10:30 o'clock, a spread of 5 1/2 cents for the hour.

In New York the break was 5 1/2 cents; St. Louis and Duluth 2 cents, and Minneapolis, 3 cents. Conditions were of the most panicky sort, and it is figured that the Gates campaign has cost its originators a very pretty sum of money. The deferred months, on the other hand, were held fairly well in hand this morning, indicating that the Armour strength is behind it.

Long on July Wheat. Armour is long on July wheat, just how long no one but himself knows, but within a week or two he has taken on ten or twelve million bushels at an average price of 87 1/2 cents. The price now hovers around this figure.

Crop conditions are ideal, and with no setback a bumper crop will begin to pour in before the end of July. It is believed that the supply of wheat will drive the price to 75 cents or lower. All of the Texas crop and the Kansas hard winter wheat can be put into Chicago before the end of July. Other States in the southern tier will contribute largely to the supply, and there is the hook upon which Mr. Gates can hang his proposition to Mr. Armour to walk up and make terms.

It is supposed that Gates still has at least 10,000,000 bushels of May wheat. It would be better to sell this to Armour at 88 or 87 cents now than to hold it, pay elevator charges and insurance and take chances on a bumper crop and 75 cents or less at the end of the year.

Prospects for the winter wheat are superb. In the States further north the plant is not far enough advanced to be in danger of frost. Floods, rust and blight are always perils, but the danger of floods is not nearly so great as it was last season. This also eliminates much of the danger of rust.

Public Help Out. One feature of the collapsed May corner that seems to have escaped attention is the fact that the public could not break into the market and take a hand. It has frequently been asked why small speculators did not take advantage of the top prices and sell short. Gates, with his millions of actual wheat to deliver, would have welcomed this promiscuous buying, and especially in the latter stages, for he could have delivered the goods or demanded the actual wheat, as the case might have been.
