HACKENSCHMIDT TO WRESTLE TEN MEN

Russian Lion Issues Broad Challenge.

DOES NOT DEBAR ANYONE

Will Forfeit \$500 if He Does Not Throw All in Ninety Minutes.

OTTAWA, Ontario, May 11.—George Hackenschmidt, the famous wrestler, will appear at St. Louis Friday, at Chicago Monday, at New York May 18, and at Baltimore May 19.

When in New York he will pose and lecture before a woman's private club for half an hour and receive \$300 for the exhibition.

Posts Forfeit. The "Russian Lion" has agreed to forfeit \$500 if at an exhibition at Montreal he does not inside of ninety minutes throw any ten heavy weight wrestlers in America, excluding Jenkins, Maupas or Gatch.

Any one of the ten not thrown within ten minutes will receive \$100. He signs his name to this published challenge. Hackenschmidt will sail for England on May 20 for an eighteen months' engagement with three theaters, each of which will pay him \$1,000 a week, or more than \$200,000 for the eighteen months.

TROTTER RACES AT BRIGHTWOOD TRACK

STANLEY TOO MUCH FOR ALOYSIUS CLUB



CLEVELAND, O., May 11.—Our wonderful Nationals arrived here yesterday in a rainstorm, which dampened everything except their enthusiasm and the dry wit of Kiltreedge and other jokers.

Cleveland is here for business purposes only. When you ask the native points of interest in the town he tells you to take a peep at the handsome dwellings on Euclid avenue and then stops short for want of something else to suggest that would attract attention.
