

Emergency Wins Debate From George Washington.

SCORE TEN POINTS TO TWO

Hurry-Up Operators Dissected Disperser Josiah Holland's Samples Twenty-two Times.

A clinic was held yesterday afternoon at Van Ness Park between doctors of the George Washington University Hospital and the Emergency Hospital as to the best method of operating on the new disease known throughout the country as spitballitis.

NEW OFFICERS ELECTED

Potomacs Reorganized—Fly to Be Held From Danville, Va., on Next Sunday.

Pigeon fanciers of Washington have begun their season. On Sunday the first fly of the spring was held, and from now on there will be a fly held every week by each of the local clubs.

The Potomac Pigeon Club, the youngest organization in the city, which disbanded last fall, has been reorganized, with nine members, who own a flying stock of 150 birds and have over 1,000 in the lofts.

The next club fly will be held on Sunday. The birds will be liberated early in the morning at Danville, Va., and will return to Washington. The distance between these points is 312 miles.
