Beldame Is Not Up To Three-Year-Old Form

Probable That Suburban Winner Will Be Retired After Saratoga Meeting—Delhi Stands High in Winners' List.

NEW YORK, July 1.—The defeat of the great Beldame by Agile and then coming back to the races in winning form were the most talked of topics around the racetrack this week.

There is some difference of opinion as to the failure of the Suburban winner, the second mare to take the blue ribbon of the American turf in its history, in the race of a week ago, when she took the dust of Capt. S. S. Brown's fleet and game youngster.

By taking second money in the Advance Stakes Beldame goes in the honor list of mares that have won \$100,000 or more on the American turf. Only two mares now rank her in the amount of money won, and both of them raced much more than she will be permitted to do.

With the exception of Domino, Hanover, and Salvator, the Brooklyn Handicap winner, Delhi is the largest \$100,000 or over money winner of the American turf to earn this distinction in three seasons' racing.

Probably as good a filly as has been seen out of some time is Whimsical, the youngster was a maiden a week or so back, but she has developed very fast with racing, and now she is one of the best of her age in training.

Since all three of these horses will have up penalties, which means that they will all carry respectable weight, the derby should decide whether Agile was at his best in the Grand and whether Oxford is a first class three-year-old. If beating Agile is a test, Oxford has proven that already, but since Agile has shown such marked improvement at Sheepshead, it is not a certainty that he was himself when Oxford whipped him in the Broadway at Gravesend. Oxford, winner of the Swift stakes at Sheepshead, is not in any of the races at Brighton. It is evidently the intention of Brady to put the Orna-

ly well in the field of big racing. He has won the Withers, worth \$5,000 in added money, with Blandly, and the Suburban, worth \$20,000, and the Standard, worth \$5,000 with Beldame.

Mr. Keene has won half the Metropolitan purse and the \$20,000 Tidal purse with Sysonby, but the gallant Melton three-year-old seems to be the only horse past two years old in his barn who is a continental.

Harry Payne Whitney has lost the services of one of the most highly tried two-year-olds in his barn for this season at least. Queen of Harts, daughter of Hamburg and Martha, and full sister of the fleet Artful, winner last year of the rich Futurity stakes, was badly cut down in the running of the Great Trial. That she will not race this season is a certainty.

Queen of Harts has been one of the finest horses in the Whitney string, and that the young master of Brookdale had high hopes concerning her was evidenced by the price he paid for her at the executor's sale of his father's estate at Gravesend the other day. Mr. Whitney gave \$18,000 for Queen of Harts.

John W. Schorr, the Memphis brewer, and until recently one of the largest Western owners of thoroughbreds, arrived here last Saturday, and will remain here for some time. He recently sold his stable and does not intend to do anything in the racing line on his own hook this year.

S. S. Mowland can do down from Buffalo to see the advance stake decided. In speaking of the racing at Buffalo, he said that while the track may not make money the outlook under the existing conditions was much more satisfactory than he had anticipated, and that it would more than probably pay expenses.

It was the first time that she ever started a horse under her own name, although two of her horses ran some horses during the Saratoga meeting.

There was a rumor at the Sheepshead Bay course yesterday that Lucien Lyne may again be retained to ride James B. Keene's racers. Lyne rode in England for Mr. Keene during the season of 1903.

The stakes of the inaugural meeting of the Narragansett Breeders' Association will close Monday, July 17, two days after the close at Kenilworth, and will continue to August 5, inclusive—eighteen racing days. Already allotments have been made for nearly 500 horses and their class and number are assurance of good sport.
