

THIRTY YEARS' GOOD SERVICE IN VINEYARD

Anniversary Celebration to Honor Dr. Frederick D. Power, of Vermont Avenue Christian Church, Will Be Inaugurated Today.

Thirty years continuously has the Rev. Dr. Frederick D. Power faithfully ministered to the spiritual welfare of the congregation of Vermont Avenue Christian Church.

Today the members of the congregation will inaugurate a celebration showing their affection for the pastor and their appreciation of his efforts in their behalf.

The services today will consist of a special sermon by the pastor and will include several special musical numbers. The main feature of the exercises will be carried out some time near the end of this month. This will give those members of the congregation who are out of the city time to return and will also be late enough for those members who expect to attend the gathering of the Christian Church in Maryland, which will be held in a few weeks' time, to also be on hand.

Special Souvenir.
Another cause of delay is because of the action of the Young People's Society, which is having a special souvenir arranged to be given out when the reception and exercises are held. Announcement will be made some time near the end of this month as to the date of the reception.

While the book will not be profusely illustrated, the pictures that are to be used will be the best obtainable and great care has been taken in their selection. A photograph of Dr. Power and one of the church as it now stands will be the features of the illustrations.

As a comparison to the present church will be a picture of the little chapel when Dr. Power started his pastorate. Accompanying this will be a picture of Dr. Power as he looked at that time.

Where Garfield Worshipped.
It was at this first chapel, so small, and almost insignificant compared to the present structure, that President Garfield went each Sabbath to attend his devotions. In one corner of the present church, in a place of honor, is kept the pew which Garfield occupied when in the chapel. This pew is only different from the others in the church because of the modest silver plate announcing the fact that it was the President's pew.

The first edition of the souvenir will be limited, and after one has been formally presented to Dr. Power, the others will be distributed among the congregation.

SOUTHERN DEMOCRATS DEMAND RECOGNITION

Both East and West Have Failed in Presenting Candidates for the Presidency.

Southern Democrats are manifesting more and more disposition to make a serious effort for recognition in their claims on their party.

They point out that the West furnished Bryan twice, and the East Parker.

The Eastern Democrats would not vote for Bryan; a million of them went Republican. The Western Democrats, likewise, would not support Parker; by the hundreds of thousands they went over to Roosevelt, while other armies of them refrained from voting.

In this situation—and the Southerners urge that there is no present evidence that these conditions will greatly change before 1936—it is urged that a good Southern man is the right man to serve as Moses to the party. The argument is interesting.

The civil war is far enough away to assure, in the language of a prominent Southerner, that "there isn't another President for the Republicans in the bloody shirt."

The South has been loyally Democratic, under the banners of both Bryan and Parker.

It isn't possible that the East should object to a Southern man as too wild on financial questions, because the financial and other other vagaries of Democracy have been Western, rather than Southern.

And on the other hand, the West cannot look back to the majorities the South gave to Bryan, and find fault with the South.

THIRTY-FIVE ESCAPE DEATH FROM A BOMB

Member of Black Hand Society Throws It in Doorway.

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—Thirty-five persons had a narrow escape from death in Williamsburg early today, when a member of a "Black Hand" society threw a bomb into the front doorway at 213 Flushing avenue.

The police believe that the intention was to kill Casino P. Liatti, a well-to-do Italian, who has a barber shop and living quarters in the building. He told the police that he had received twenty-five threatening letters within a year.

TWENTY GIRLS FAINT AFTER PANIC FROM FIRE

CHICAGO, Sept. 16.—Fire in the basement of the north section of the Occidental building caused a panic among 50 girls employed in the eight-story structure at Market and Washington streets this morning.

Order was restored only after men employed there had persuaded fifty young women to leave the fire escapes on three sides of the structure. The women then turned to the stairs and elevator, and were conducted safely to the street.

Twenty of the girls fainted after order had been restored.
