

**RICH MR. TISDALE  
FOUND IN RIVER**

Body of Missing Miner  
Floats in Harlem.

**MISSED FOR THREE WEEKS**

No Evidence of Violence, and Money  
and Jewelry Were Found  
Intact.

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—The body of John N. Tisdale, the wealthy Alaska mine owner, who disappeared from his apartments at the Hotel Seville, was found floating in the Harlem river, at Lincoln avenue, the Bronx.

**Wife Is Notified.**

Mrs. Tisdale was notified at the Hotel Seville. There was no evidence to sustain the original theory that Tisdale had been a victim of thugs. His watch, valued at \$200, heavily jeweled, and a heavy gold chain, \$250 in money and a costly gold pin were found on the body. There were no marks to suggest an assault save on the head, and Coroner Berry is positive that these came about in a natural way.

**Two Weeks in Water.**

The body appeared to have been in the water at least two weeks, and the police, who suggested that the man was a suicide, think it had remained in the water three weeks.

Mr. Tisdale left his hotel Monday noon, telling his wife that he was going to walk on Fifth avenue and was later going to the Grand Central station to buy tickets for Boston. He was to preside at a meeting of the directors of the Alaska Sulphur and Gold Mining Company, of which he was president. Tuesday afternoon in Boston.

**Bought Ticket to Boston.**

It was found that he had purchased his ticket and arranged for the transfer of his baggage, but the railroad company informed the family later that the tickets had not been used.

Mr. Tisdale's home was formerly in Cheyenne, Wyo. He arrived in New York November 1, after an extensive tour of inspection of his mining interests, which were considerable, carrying him from Alaska to Georgia. Mrs. Tisdale had then been at the Seville two months.

She had written to her mother in Silver Lake, Conn., that she would drown herself and told where her body might be found.

**Capitol, Spick and Span,  
Awaits Congress' Opening**

Many Members of Both Houses Already  
Here—Proceedings of First Day Will  
Merely Be Routine.

Arrangements for the opening of the first session of the fifty-ninth Congress next Monday are practically complete at both ends of the Capitol. More than half of the members of House and Senate are already assembled in Washington, and those who are yet absent will put in an appearance as soon as they can get away from their family Thanksgiving dinners.

A number of important and interesting changes have been made at the Capitol, in anticipation of the reassembling of the law makers. A new and extensive ventilating system has been put in, and the improvement is distinctly noticeable. The interior of the Rotunda has been restored in such a manner that it now looks as clean and new as it did half a century ago.

The great allegorical picture in the roof was renewed by skilled painters, all the paint was scratched from the stone walls so that the stone carvings, wreaths and garlands, some of them representing scenes from the Colonial days and the early history of the country, again stand out in sharp outline, the dust of decades removed from their beautiful surfaces. There will be 1,500 electric lights in the rejuvenated Rotunda, and there will be no more soot and smoke from gas jets to age the historical paintings and their frame work, which latter has been all gone over with gold foil.

**New Bronze Doors.**

Two new massive bronze doors have been placed in the House wing, the design for which was begun forty-seven years ago, at Rome, by Thomas Crawford, the American sculptor, which, with their frames, weigh seven tons, and which were recently finished at his Chicopee, Mass., foundry, by Melzar H. Mosman for a price of \$45,000.

The proceedings in the Senate next Monday will be exceedingly brief. That august body will be called to order by Vice President Fairbanks at noon. Prayer will be offered by Chaplain Edward Everett Hale. Then comes the roll call, and the presentation and swearing in of the new members. Resolutions will be adopted informing the House that the Senate is assembled and ready to proceed to business and providing for the appointment of a committee to act with a similar committee on the part of the House to notify the President that the Congress is ready to receive any communication he may desire to transmit. A resolution will be adopted fixing noon as the daily hour of meeting, and then the Senate will be formally notified of the death of its late member, Orville H. Platt of Connecticut. As a further mark of respect to his memory, the Senate will then adjourn, an agreement having been reached by which the President will not submit his annual message until the following day.

**Opening in the House.**

The House will be called to order by the clerk of the last House, Hon. Alexander McDowell. Chaplain Henry N. Couden will offer a prayer. The roll will be called, and the House will proceed to the election of a Speaker. "Uncle Joe" Cannon, of Illinois, the Speaker of the last House, will be placed in nomination by the Republicans. John Sharp Williams, of Mississippi, will receive the honorary nomination from his Democratic colleagues. Tellers will be appointed, and a roll call will ensue. Clerk McDowell will announce the result, and Williams, the defeated candidate, will escort "Uncle Joe" to the chair. A brief speech by the new Speaker, and Representative Bingham, of Pennsylvania, the "Father of the House," will administer to him the oath of office. 
