

## DOUBTERS HINDER UNIVERSAL PEACE

Representative Bartholdt's  
Plans to Prevent Strikes.

### WHERE HEROISM LIES

Nobler to Prevent War Than to In-  
dulge in Ideals of a Soldier's  
Career.

Representative Richard Bartholdt, of Missouri, was the speaker last evening before the Missouri Society at Pythian Temple. Before a large audience, among which were Congressmen Burton, Rodenberg, Lloyd, Fulkerson and Kinkaid, Mr. Bartholdt predicted the ultimate success of the movement for universal peace and explained the workings of The Hague conference.

After Mr. Bartholdt's speech, an excellent musical program was given.

#### Scores Doubting Thomases.

Among the great hindrances of the cause of world peace, Mr. Bartholdt placed the "doubting Thomases" who do not believe in it, and those persons who look upon the soldier as an ideal to be lived up to and to be worshiped. He declared that every day in peace there is more real heroism displayed than in time of war, for he argued that it is nobler to restrain one's wild wrath than to strike an enemy in anger.

"Another hindrance," he said, "is our system of education, which holds up to the pupils the soldier as a great ideal. The school should be used to curb, not stimulate, the brute instincts of children. Above all things, the school room is no place for military drills. Let the boys have physical training, as much of it as they want, but put away from the school everything that smacks of militarism."

#### Strong Peace Sentiment.

Mr. Bartholdt declared that there is everywhere a strong sentiment growing up for universal peace and said it would be accomplished by arbitration treaties between the nations of the world and by an international congress to declare what international law is.

### PRESENT FOR LONGWORTH FROM HIS CONSTITUENTS

People of First Ohio Congress District

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Jan. 27.—Congressman Nicholas Longworth will be remembered by the people of his district, the First Ohio, on the occasion of his marriage to Miss Alice Roosevelt. A movement was inaugurated today to raise funds among his constituents by a popular subscription and use the money to buy him a suitable wedding present.

The matter is in charge of a committee composed of George Y. Banter, Frank Woodrow and James Coston. Longworth is very popular among the electors of his territory. It is estimated that a considerable sum will be collected. Contributions will be limited to \$1 each. The committee hopes to raise \$1,000.

### OVERTHROW OF CASTRO HOPED FOR BY FRANCE

Paris Has News That Malcontents in  
Venezuela Are Plotting Revolution  
Against President.

PARIS, Jan. 27.—According to reliable news received here from Venezuela, there is a plot in the country against President Castro. Malcontents at home and abroad are reported to be intriguing to overthrow Castro. The conspirators, it is said, are planning to seize Maracaibo and liberate all the prisoners in the state prisons.

The news of the arrival of the French cruisers Desaix and Jurien de la Graviere at Willemstad is confirmed. It is not believed that any direct action on the part of France will be taken for several weeks.

## MURDER SUSPECTS FREED BY COURT

Meeks and Foster Released  
After Long Examination.

### VERDICT IS APPLAUDED

Prosecuting Attorney Brent Made  
Determined Effort to Hold Men  
for Death of Curtain.

The case of Harry Meeks and Herbert Foster came to an end at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, when Justice Catton discharged the prisoners, stating that no evidence had been presented in the investigation on which to hold them. James Gorman and LeRoy Beach, held as witnesses, were also released.

Commonwealth's Attorney Brent thought that there was abundant evidence to hold the prisoners. He said that the circumstances were such as to justify the grand jury to go into an examination.

#### Lack of Evidence.

Mr. Johnson, for the prisoners, insisted that there was no evidence whatever in the case to justify holding the young men.

Justice Catton, in giving his decision, said that he had as great a desire as any person in the world to see the guilty punished, but he could not conscientiously, after hearing the sixty witnesses who had given testimony, see anything in the evidence which would lead him to believe that the young men were at all concerned in the murder of Curtin.

#### Applaud Decision.

Considerable applause in one part of the room followed his decision. Scores of spectators congratulated the young men.

The testimony presented did not differ in any material way from the evidence adduced on the first day of the examination.

### RUNAWAY HORSE TRIES TO GET INTO SENATE

A horse attached to a wagon owned by Ralph Steele, of 336 New Jersey avenue northwest, and driven by Philip Walker, ran away from New Jersey avenue and E street northwest, about 5:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon, and collided with an arch of the Capitol on the Senate side. The driver was thrown out and bruised about the head and body. He was sent to the Casualty Hospital. The shafts of the wagon were broken. The horse was caught by police at Fifth and E streets southeast.

### TEETH KNOCKED OUT BY UNIDENTIFIED MAN

Struck in the mouth by an unidentified colored man, Junius James, colored, twenty-four years old, of 1526 Pierce place northwest, lost several of his teeth and also received several painful lacerations of the cheeks last night. He was sent to the Emergency Hospital by police of the Eighth precinct, who are looking for his assailant.

## MUNICH MAKES DATES WITH SLOT MACHINES

Public Messages Carried All Over Town  
With System of Wires and  
Pneumatic Tubes.

MUNICH, Jan. 27.—A new and convenient automatic and pneumatic tube service has just been put into practice here.

In the railway stations and public squares, conventional looking boxes are placed, having on the upper surface about half a dozen blank disks. If Mr. A. has given Mr. B. an appointment at, say, a railway station and finds that he cannot possibly keep it, he writes a note, with Mr. B's name plainly set forth on the outside, and drops it into a slot, at the same time dropping a penny into another slot.

## C. T. YERKES LEFT FIFTEEN MILLIONS

Wife Gets Two Hundred Thousand,  
Household Effects and Stables,  
With Provision for Museum.

CHICAGO, Jan. 27.—The will of the late Charles T. Yerkes, the millionaire traction magnate, was filed in the probate court today. It disposes of an estate valued at \$15,000,000.

Mrs. Mary Adelaide Yerkes, the widow, is bequeathed \$200,000, and the household effects and horses and carriages. Charles T. Yerkes, Jr., is left \$200,000, and Mrs. Bessie Rondella, a daughter, an equal amount. Miss Ethel Yerkes, a daughter of Clarence Yerkes, and the former household servants are each given \$2,000 by the will.

From \$30,000 to \$5,000 are given to other relatives. The University of Chicago is given \$1,000.

A lot at Sixty-eighth street and Fifth avenue, New York, is bequeathed to the Yerkes Art Museum. A fund provides for the maintenance, the amount of which is unknown, the detailed provisions of the testament being withheld from the public at present.

A fund of \$150,000 is provided for grounds and buildings of the Yerkes hospital. One-half of the residuary estate will go to the maintenance of this institution after the death of Mrs. Yerkes.
