Welcomed Only by Butler, President's Daughter and Husband Enter Their Honeymoon Home.

The departure of Mr. and Mrs. Longworth from the White House was effected quickly, suddenly and without incident.

Bridal Journey Twenty Minutes.

The vehicle employed was a large touring car belonging to John R. McLean, and the couple, unaccompanied, were driven rapidly out to Mr. McLean's country place, "Friendship," on the "Smalltown" road.

Wanted to See Mrs. Longworth.

Scarcely a man, woman, or child in Washington has not seen Miss Roosevelt, the popular daughter of the nation's President, and most of those in the crowds, no doubt, knew her at once by sight.

When the last of the guests had departed, and all the carriages had disappeared from the ellipse about the White Lot, the crowd still remained, but restless. All desired to see the bridal couple, but none was certain as to the point of meeting.

Auto Dashes Up.

There were others, however, who observed that the gates opening Executive avenue into Pennsylvania avenue were still closed after the last of the guests had departed, and a large number made their way through the State, War, and Navy Building and out into the streets below.

The machine was driven by Samuel A. Luttrell and J. C. Duval, expert chauffeurs, who have a reputation in Newport, Lenox, and big Eastern cities, as the best drivers in the country.

Scarcely a half-dozen persons were in the vicinity when, at ten minutes past four, the machine again dashed down the grounds, entered the square, and the gate and howled rapidly up over the winding carriage way to the south entrance.

Departure Somewhat Secret.

Only a few persons saw the departure. On a balcony from an office of the Navy Department, a small group continued to watch, and when the automobile dashed up into the grounds they were quickly alerted.

President Threw a Slipper.

The President, hitherto, was as active as any, and as the doors were closed, hands and kerchiefs were waved, and the many kind wishes for the bride and groom were given.

Bride's Brothers Threw Rice.

The machine sped ahead, but the bride's brothers and several others ran a few steps after them, still throwing rice that did not even strike the carriage.

At Dupont circle the machine turned into Massachusetts avenue and went through this thoroughfare to Rock Creek bridge, after crossing which the young married couple resolved their first bumps in life together.
