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MINERS FOR PEACE WITHIN THE RANKS BEFORE STRIKING Jarring Element in Organization Will Be Sidetracked. MAY HELP WESTERN MEN Probable Appropriation to Aid Those Under Arrest in Murder Trial.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., March 16.—The policy which the leaders of the United Mine Workers of America are pursuing is gradually becoming apparent. Indications at the second day's session of the convention tended to warrant the prediction that before any actual consideration of a strike is taken up all jarring elements in the organization will be sidetracked.

FIGHT FOR APPROPRIATION. 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FORTY ROASTED ALIVE IN WRECK BEYOND DENVER

Uninjured Helplessly Watch Flames Cook Wounded Pinned Under Two Trains in Blinding Snow Near Florence, Col. GAS TANKS EXPLODE AT ONCE WHEN EXPRESS HITS LOCAL Many Relief Trains Rushed to Spot to Save What Victims They Can of Mis-carriage of Orders.

DENVER, March 16.—From forty to fifty passengers were killed or roasted alive after a collision between two passenger trains on the Denver and Rio Grande railroad at 2 o'clock this morning. The trains, one of them a double-header, met at Adobe Station, on a curve near Florence, in the Arkansas valley, 140 miles from Denver.

FEW OF DEAD IDENTIFIED YET. The identified dead so far are: WILLIAM HOLLIS, of Pueblo, engineer, No. 16. E. M. McPARLAND, of Denver, Globe express messenger, No. 18, relative of Detective McParland.
