

NARROWEST HOUSE IN WASHINGTON

Only Thirteen and One-half Feet Wide, But Complete in All Its Appointments.

One of the curiosities of building in the city has stood for some time in Massachusetts avenue near Fourth street northwest and attracts the attention of the passer-by on account of its extreme narrowness and the very shallow depth of the lot. It looks very much as if a small section of ground had been left over in the subdivision of the square and some very thrifty person had discovered it and successfully planned and built a cozy home that would equal in comfort, if not in size the dwellings of more pretentious dimensions.

The lot has a frontage of 13 1/2 feet with very little depth and covering it entirely is a neat two-story and basement brick dwelling containing six rooms fitted up in the most convenient manner with bath and all the accessories needed to make a comfortable home. A striking feature is the massive marble steps leading to the upper front door, which are at all times kept scrupulously white, showing the attention of the careful housewife.

The owner is a carpenter and builder, who designed and built the house entirely after his own plans and who finds that joy and comfort in the possession of his tiny home that is no way inferior to the mansions of "castles and baronial piles."

ODD ABODES OF THE OYSTER. Mr. Oyster didn't relish losing his anchorage very much and the cutter had to give him a couple of sticks of dynamite to pull him from the teeth. I wished afterward that I had kept it intact, because I could have used it for a couple of oysters. "What do you think of a skull full of oysters? Sort of unsavory, eh? Well, I've seen a lot of them in the dredge and it was just brimming full of the finest bivalves that ever hung on a beach. Some of them had chucked a boss overboard maybe years before and the oysters had made a sort of apartment house out of the bones. But, as it is, I mate, when it comes to queer places to live the oyster can give the octopus cards and spades every time."

UNIQUE METHODS OF THE MASONIC BURGLAR

Proved Himself to Be a Member of the Ancient Fraternity—Had Much Loot in Rooms.

NEW YORK, May 5.—The "Masonic burglar," whose real name is William McIntzine, was arraigned in the Tombs police court this morning before Magistrate Breen and turned over to the Brooklyn police. He will be arraigned in the Adams street police court later. George E. Gale, of 121 Danbridge street, Brooklyn, is the complainant. He promulgated McIntzine when the latter made an unexpected visit to the house after all the family were in bed that he wouldn't call the police for three minutes. Both men were Masons. For that reason Gale did not lose his watch and some of the other valuables in the bedroom where McIntzine found him and he found McIntzine. Nevertheless the burglar did make off with a good deal of loot.

McIntzine was first pedigreed as James Barrett. Central office men brought a quantity of stuff which had been found in his rooms at 139 East Thirteenth street. Mrs. Gale visited headquarters this morning and identified some clothing and a few pieces of jewelry which had been taken from her home. Some \$2,000 worth of goods remained yet unidentified.

The story that McIntzine was a Mason has been denied, but this morning in court two or three men asked him questions which they said only a Mason could answer intelligently. They were satisfied with his replies. He remarked at length: "This is neither the time nor the place to discuss Masonry. The police declare that McIntzine is a new trick to them. They have found evidences of the use of sulphuric acid. He was in the habit of getting into houses through back windows. These are often protected by iron bars set in lead. A few drops of acid softened this metal enough so that the intruder was able to pull the bar out of place. The police declare that McIntzine was sent to Elmira for shooting at a policeman in Brooklyn. That appears to have been one of his favorite diversions."
