LONGWORTHS GO TO KIEL AS GUESTS OF EMPEROR

President's Daughter Says She Is Delighted With England, But Is None the Less Loyal to America.

LONDON, June 22.—The first section of the London visit of the Longworths was ended today, when they took steamer for their trip to Kiel, where during the yacht races they will be the guests of Kaiser Wilhelm. They expect to return in time for the drawing-room next week, when they will be formally presented to the King and Queen.

Mrs. Longworth, before her departure this morning, said:

"We have simply been delighted with

our visit to England. Our reception has been most cordial, and everything possible will be done for our pleasure. We anticipate a most pleasing visit at Kiel. Mr. Longworth and I both are fond of yachting, and I understand there will be some fine racing. "We will return to the United States early in August. I have seen nothing yet to make me any the less a loyal, patriotic American. We realize what a splendid country we have when we see other countries."
