SOUTHERN TRADE EASILY CAPTURED

Way Shown by Two Members of Business Men's Association.

GOOD SALESMEN AND ADS.

Friendly Feeling Toward Washington Prevalent Among the Merchants of Dixie.

How, in their opinion, the great bulk of Southern trade may be brought to the merchants of this city, was told by Ross P. Andrews and Louis P. Shoemaker, at a meeting of the board of directors of the Business Men's Association last night, at Gude's Hall.

These business men accompanied the Greater Washington special through the South, and came to the meeting prepared to tell what they saw on the trip, how the Southern merchants received the invasion of Washington business men, and what would be the possibilities growing out of a well-organized plan on the part of local business houses to capture the Southern trade.

Mr. Andrews, who made a special study of the paper industry while away with the "trade-getting" party, declared that it is necessary to secure a large part of this coveted trade, is for Washington business firms to send capable salesmen into the field prepared to sell as well-made and as cheap goods as those of the wholesalers of Baltimore and New York.

SENTIMENT IS FRIENDLY

Southern merchants, declared Mr. Shoemaker, showed their preference for trading with Washington business houses, provided they could do so as well as in other cities. He was impressed with this friendly sentiment, he said, which seemed almost universal. He also was told by merchants in several leading Southern cities through which the special train passed, that many of their number were in the habit of passing on through Washington to Baltimore and New York when buying goods, being under the impression that better bargains could be obtained in those cities than in the Capital.
