KILLED HERSELF TO SAVE HER SICK HUSBAND

Accused Him to Police of Abusing Her.

Fearing that she would be haled to the Police Court to testify against her husband, and would be the means of sending him to jail as the result of a complaint lodged against him for alleged mistreatment of the day before, Mrs. Rosa Masius committed suicide shortly after 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon by cutting her throat from ear to ear in a room on the second floor of a lodging house, at 22 E street northwest.

The woman's husband, Albert G. Masius, is a translator in the employ of the Department of Agriculture. He had been in ill health for some time, and for the last week had been absent from his desk on sick leave. Mrs. Masius, it is said, had been suffering from neurasthenia, and was in a highly nervous state. Masius was sitting in an open window yesterday afternoon, while his wife lay on a couch at the foot of the bed, apparently asleep.

Thought Herself Insane.

Sitting up on the edge of the couch, she said: "I believe I'm going insane." "No you're not," her husband told her. The couple occupied two rooms, one used as a living room and the other as a kitchen. Mrs. Masius went to the kitchen, and a few minutes later her husband heard her fall to the floor. Rushing to the back room, he found his wife lying on the floor, with blood gushing from the wound in her neck. Masius went immediately to the Sixth precinct police station, which is just around the corner, and told the police his wife had attempted to kill herself. Captain Byrne and Lieutenant Hodges accompanied Masius to the house, and after the arrival of Coroner Nevitt, Masius was locked up pending a further investigation of the circumstances. He was released this morning, however. It was a clear case of suicide.

When the police arrived Mrs. Masius was lying, half clad, in a pool of blood, having severed the jugular vein. By her right side was a large carving knife, with which she had cut her throat. There were still signs of life, and a hurry call having been sent to the Casualty Hospital, the doctor was made by the police to stop the flow of blood. The women died a few minutes after the ambulance came.

Accused Husband to Police.

Monday afternoon Mrs. Masius went to the Sixth precinct station and told Captain Byrne that her husband had been drinking, and also abusing her during the day. Two policemen were sent to the house, but no arrests were made. She was very nervous, and was unable to tell a lucid story. According to the police, the woman had been drinking heavily for some time, and shortly before coming to the station-house Monday, had sent a colored girl after a bottle of whisky.

Mrs. Masius was forty-three years old. She originally came from Egg Harbor, N. J. Mr. and Mrs. Masius had been married eighteen years, and had three children. By an order of the court, lately issued, the children were turned over to Mrs. Masius' sister, and since that time have been living in Egg Harbor. Masius gives his age as fifty-three.
